Twenty thousand bills were introduced in the last congress, and about 2000 became laws.

The London postal parcel traffic at Christmas numbered 1,150,000 packages, many containing turkeys and plum puddings.

Dakota has a 1500 foot well, six inches in diameter, and throwing 4000 gallons of water a minute. There are in that region wells 3000 feet deep.

At Croyden County Council, England, the medical officer has reported that ninety-three cases of diphtheria have been traced to milk supplied from one farm.

The world is more and more realizing that the great fulness and richness and completeness of life is attained in just the degree in which we can serve our fellowmen.

The Welsh colony in Patagonia was last fall visited by scores of the black-breasted swan, which could be killed with sticks. They had left the interior because the streams and lakes had dried up. The colony numbers about 2000 souls.

The postmaster-general has issued orders that no post office in the country shall be open on Sunday after 10 a. m. This is to give post office officials and employees a chance to go to church.

Senator Isham G. Harris, of Tennessee, says that if Governor Campbell of Ohio should be re-elected this fall it will secure his nomination for the presidency. He says Cleveland's silver letter ruins his chances for the nomination.

California papers now charge that De Young of the Chronicle sold 24 votes in the legislature to Felton for \$26,500. No wonder the republican ship is sinking day by day. It is evidently overloaded and top heavy.

The Oregonian attempts to show that the Farmer's Alliance is the cause of "hard times" in Kansas. A farmer at our elbow who claims to be fully advised in the premises says that no one cause has been so potent in producing hard times as the McKinley bill. The farmer is right.

The Independent Order of Odd Fellows of the United States expended for relief during the year ending December 31, 1888 the sum of \$2,501,380.23. This amounts to \$682.83 for every day, or \$285.54 for every hour, or \$4.75 for every minute in the year.

The state commissioner of New Hampshire reports 800 abandoned farms. In Vermont farms are offered for sale at from \$3 to \$5 per acre, while in Pennsylvania the depreciation in farm values for the past ten years has been fully forty per cent, and it still increases.

Henry Cabot Lodge says his force bill will be the issue in 1892. The Massachusetts statesman should remember the story of that debtor against whom an account was sent by an eastern firm who received the reply, "Debtor is dead," and then, failing to enter the notice on its books, when it sent the same notice the next month was informed "The debtor is still dead." Lodge and his force bill will be re-dead in 1892 than today, but both will be dead enough.

New York's great aqueduct was opened recently, and a water supply of 318,000,000 gallons every twenty-four hours is now available. It is one of the most stupendous works which even this generation, so familiar with stupendousness of all kinds, has produced. Its length is about thirty miles, being for nearly all that distance far underground, and passing by means of an ingenious siphon system under instead of over the Harlem river. Its cost is about \$23,000,000, and the system of dams in process of construction will add many more millions to that.

Anti-trust laws have been passed by several states, and others are considering the matter with a view to enacting similar laws. Wisconsin has a bill before its legislature covering this point, which makes the forming of trusts or other combination, etc., to restrict trade or competition an illegal act, and provides a heavy penalty for a violation of the law. But somehow or other such laws do not prevent trusts being formed, as there is always a loophole of escape, and this the combinations find out sooner or later, and in one way or another evade the law.

A conference of republican senators from the northwest was lately held in New York city to consider the course that section should take in the next presidential election. Among those present were senators Plumb of Kansas, Teller of Colorado, Pettigrew of South Dakota, Stewart of Nevada, Washburn and Davis of Minnesota, Spooner of Wisconsin, Hansbrough of North Dakota and others. When the name of Harrison was suggested as a presidential candidate objections were raised on account of his anti-slavery views. Finally it was agreed that the best thing to do was to make a united effort to secure the nomination of Blaine as the best thing to do under the circumstances.

A southern club at Harvard recalls the old days before the war when students from the south were far more numerous at Cambridge than they were in the quarter of a century that followed the civil conflict. The southern element at Harvard has begun to pick up again, apparently. It is a good sign.

The English Empire is soon to have its census taken. That of India began last week, and it is expected to show a population of 280,000,000, as against 254,000,000 in 1881.
