At the time of death Bloomer Bilyen, nearly 19 years old, was generally well liked by his friends and acquaintances. The family seems to be an unfortunate one. Of six children but two are now living. Two died of sickness, and another was so severely burned that death ensued.—Press.

TEACHER'S INSTITUTE.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON.
The subject of truancy was opened by Prof Trulove, of Shedd, and caused some discussion.
A live discussion was indulged in on the subject of school exhibitions, closed by Prof Condit.

THURSDAY EVENING.
Again the opera house was packed to overflowing, long before the exercises began. Some fine orchestra music was furnished by the college orchestra. An instrumental trio and song without words, by the Misses Richards and William Richards, was a bright affair. Two songs by the Apollo club, on the program, were gems of vocal music.

The address by President Brownson, of McMinville college, on "Arnold of Rugby and Wayland of Brown," was an elaborate and able historical effort. A violin and piano duet by H J Hopkins and daughter, entitled "Nymph of the Mountain," met with great favor. Miss Alice Moses, of the college, was heard in a recitation, well rendered in her popular manner.

A dumb bell drill by school boys showed thorough drill and was a pretty exercise. Mrs Barney Howe, of Brownsville, was heard in a recitation, displaying fair talent.

The song by Miss Grace Riley, of Crawfordville, was one of the best things of the evening. Miss Riley has a remarkably fine voice, well controlled.

Miss Grace Love, of the public schools was heard in a recitation, well received. The audience was a very appreciative one, every piece on the program being encored, and all but one responded to that of Miss Love.

MORNING SESSION.
Friday, April 3, 1891.

Institute met at 9 o'clock. Prof McCourt, of California, explained his system of teaching the metre system, decimals, and weights and measures, by means of blocks.

Mr Barzee made a motion that the institute pass resolutions endorsing his methods. Institute voted in favor of the motion. Remarks were made by Miss Gray, Mr Michener, Mr Barzee and Mr Brown.

Return certificates were distributed and teachers enrolled.
Prof Michener read an interesting paper on the topic of the "Common School Hydra." He spoke in favor of graded country schools, and pointed out the defects of the present unsystematic work in our country schools. Remarks were made by Supt Russell, Mrs Lambson, Mr Brown, Prof Walker and Van Scoy. All spoke in favor of graded work.

Prof Van Scoy, of Jefferson, read an able paper on Physiology and Hygiene.
Mrs Wilson, of Albany, made an earnest appeal to the teachers to lend a helping hand in aiding the W C T U, and the mothers, in combating the evil influences which surround the children of our homes.

Prof Walker read an instructive paper on the topic, "Subject vs Predicate." Miscellaneous questions were answered by the teachers.

AFTERNOON SESSION.
Prof Wright, of Lebanon, read an interesting paper on, "Do our Public Schools meet the reasonable wants of the Community in regard to teaching Morals and Manners."

Mrs Grubbs, of Salem, read a paper on the subject of "Reading Circles and School Journals."

The subject was discussed by Prof Condit, followed by a lengthy explanation of the workings of the state reading circle, by Prof Horner, of Roseburg.
