

MONTAGUE ATTACHED.—S. Nickerson, of San Francisco, on Saturday brought suit in the interest of Francisco creditors, attaching the property of C. B. Montague, of Albany, as follows: Cash, \$100.00; Bonds, \$100.00; P. & C. Co., \$150.00; D. B. Black & Co., \$100.00; Straus & Levy, \$100.00; Murphy & Co., \$100.00; L. E. Frick & Co., \$100.00; A. Schilling & Co., \$100.00. Total, \$1,000.00. The suit was filed in the superior court. Other liabilities against Mr. Montague's total liability are about \$200,000, while his assets, consisting of a large stock of goods, a large and considerable real estate property in Albany, have been estimated at \$700,000. The suit was undoubtedly paid in order to settle the matter. A judgment of the court will leave Mr. Montague a fine.

GRADUAL INCREASE.—The gross receipts of the Albany P. O. for the four months ending March 31st, 1891, were: To June 30, 1890, \$175,246.26; To Sept. 30, 1890, \$175,547.15; To Dec. 31, 1890, \$201,377.77; To March 31, 1891, \$174,297.77. Total, \$726,471.95. The gross receipts of this office will be readjusted on the gross receipts for the four months preceding ending March and will go into effect with the commencement of fiscal year, viz: July 1st and continue for one year. Gross receipts, \$7,000, and not exceeding \$8,000, a salary of \$1,000 per annum. The salary will be classed as 2nd class when receipts reach \$8,000.

COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

Saturday evening, April 4, 1891.

Present: Mayor, Recorder, and Councilmen French, Tabler, Hawkins, Burkhardt and Garrett.

F. M. French and C. G. Burkhardt, of the ways and means committee, presented the following self-explanatory report, which, on motion was unanimously adopted:

We, your committee on ways and means, to whom was referred the petition of Foshay & Mason, L. F. Finn, and others, asking the city council to purchase of the Albany Ferry Co., their ferryboat, cable and other things appertaining thereto, beg leave to submit the following report: We would recommend that the prayers of the petitioners be not granted.
