LOCAL RECORD.

A FIRE.—About 8 o'clock last evening fire was discovered in the barn of Mrs. Jane Stinson, between Second and Third Streets, in the Third Ward. It soon communicated with the barn of Hon. H. A. Irving, burning both to the ground. Crossing the alley it began to burn the John Fox, when after a long and tedious delay water was secured and the flames extinguished. In the mean time the H. & L. Co. had done much to protect adjoining property. The barns were nearly three blocks from water, and the heat had to be spiced. Two sections burst, the replacing causing an aggravating delay. The loss amounted to about \$300. It was the biggest blaze in Albany for several years. The fire was incendiary. Who did it? The night before a bunch of straw saturated with kerosene was found in the barn of Mr. George Patterson ready for igniting on short notice, showing that there is a barn fire bug around. Our citizens should be on their guard.

There will be preaching services tomorrow at the Presbyterian church at 11 a. m., Sabbath School at 12:35 p. m., Y. P. S. C. E. prayer meeting at 6:45 p. m. Subject of the sermon, "Sonship." No evening service, the congregation will unite in the union services held at the Opera House.

A SERIOUS RUNAWAY.—Yesterday Mr. John Morgan, residing near Shedd, was starting for Albany with a four horse team and a load of oats when the horses became unmanageable and ran away, scattering the oats and throwing Mr. Morgan to the ground. His shoulder, broken by a runaway only a couple months ago, was rebroken. The horses ran several miles, stopping near the Oak Creek church. Mr. Morgan has had more than his share of misfortune recently.

TO FIREMEN.—On account of an accident happening at the fire last night the engine of Linn Engine Co. No. 2 has been taken out of service for repairs. In case of an alarm all members of the company are requested to assist the other companies until their engine is again ready for duty.

A FIRE ACCIDENT.—Last evening while working at the fire Deputy Sheriff Charles Scott in descending from a ladder, slipped on a round stick, throwing him down and dislocating his ankle, so that it will be some time before he will have good use of it. Dr. Maston set the limb this morning.

JUMPING ON TRAINS.—There is an ordinance against jumping on trains by boys in the city limits. This is being violated daily at the S. P. depot, and the Marshal requests us to give the offenders warning that they had better quit the dangerous practice at once.
