

WASHINGTON. (From our regular correspondent.)

WASHINGTON, April 6, 1891.

The crowning shame of the republican administration occurred, if my information be correct, and I have every reason for believing that it is, Saturday afternoon, when J Gould accompanied by his son George called at the White House and delivered his orders to Mr Harrison, together with his ultimatum as to what he would do if they were not obeyed.

Gould told Mr Harrison that unless his demands were met he might as well abandon all hope of a vindication in the shape of a re-nomination, and from the smile Gould wore when he clambered into his private car, enroute for St Louis, Mr Harrison must have promised him something.

Another scandal has been talked around town about the new contract for supplying the Post Office Department with postal cards. By the way, the new cards, which are to be furnished in two sizes and colors, are to have a design that would reflect no credit upon a cross-road printer upon the address side, in the upper right hand corner of which is to be a portrait of General Grant.

Mr Blaine is rolling in the glory he obtained by calling the bluff of the Italian Government, but for some reason he refuses to give out a copy of the last despatch he received from Rudini, the Italian prime minister, and all the information we have had about the despatch, said to be a straight back-down on the part of the Italian government, has come by press-cable from Rome.

NOT GUILTY.

Now we submit to any candid reader whether there is a single line or word in the extract taken from the DEMOCRAT by the Journal that in the remotest degree would be understood as discrediting the alliance. The only criticism was on the course of the two papers in attempting to secure recognition as the organs of the alliance. We are not aware that either one of the editors of the two papers named are members of the alliance. If they are not

then what we said could not in any sense be applied to the alliance. If they are our criticism of the outside conduct of one or two members could not be construed as meaning dissensions except as between two members about a matter more or less foreign to the objects and purposes of the order. An alliance man casually made the remark that there was a scramble between the two papers to secure recognition and we so referred to it. We trust Bro. McGill for whom we have none but the kindest feeling will see that he does the DEMOCRAT an injustice by alleging against us that of which we are not guilty.

It is stated that Congressman Mills will not be in the race for the Speakership, and that the fact will be formally announced as soon as the opponents of Crisp feel confident that they can beat him. The plan is for Mills to come out in an interview stating that he has come to the conclusion that the speakership should go to a northern man, and suggesting Judge Holman, of Indiana, as the man.
