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Y. M. C. A. Anniversary.

The Second Anniversary of the Y M C A of Albany was held at the Opera House Sunday evening before a packed house.

The exercises were interesting, and left a good impression as to the value of the association to the city.

The invocation was offered by Rev E R Pritchard, followed by a hymn, with organ accompaniment by S N Steele and David Link.

The Lord's prayer was repeated by the audience, a responsive reading was conducted by H W Young, Rev S G Irvine offered prayer, Rev Geo W Hill conducted a scripture reading.

Number of gospel meetings at 4 p m Sunday (19 weeks), 19; total number attending gospel meetings, 1229; number of noon day prayer meetings, 12; number of special gospel meetings, 6; number of requests for prayer, 16; number of professed conversions, 4; visits to the rooms, 2725; number of letters written by men (stationery furnished free), 26; number directed to boarding places, 10; number secured employment, 7; number otherwise assisted, 14; number of committee meetings, 13; number of directors' meetings, 6; cost of building site, (secured at very low price), \$300; money raised by subscription (to date) to pay for same, \$2335; income from rent of buildings on building site (for one year), \$414.

The estimated expenses for the coming year were placed at \$1741, including following: Indebtedness, \$150; lights, \$100; janitor, \$75; printing, \$60; literature, \$40; wood, \$30; interest, \$300; insurance, \$17; taxes, \$25; repairs, \$25; incidentals, \$25; salary of Secretary, \$720.

The estimated income is, one hundred members at \$5 per member, \$500; from rent of buildings on building site, \$414; entertainments and lectures, \$100; total, \$1014.

Prof W Allen Shorey delivered an able address on young men, and the audience were given an opportunity to subscribe towards the support of the association.

The amount of subscriptions raised towards the balance of about \$700 required was about \$300.

OREGON WEATHER BUREAU. CENTRAL OFFICE, PORTLAND, OREGON. CROP-WEATHER BULLETIN No. 5, FOR THE WEEK ENDING SATURDAY, APRIL 11, 1894.

The temperature has risen slightly during the week, being almost normal.

Farm work is slowly progressing. Seeding on uplands is being pushed rapidly; on low lands the soil is too wet to be worked.

Stock wintered well, the loss has been practically nothing, the range is becoming better. Some cattle are yet fed, but sheep generally get sufficient food on the range.
