LOCAL RECORD.

MISS EMILY PITT STEVENS, of California, is in the city. She is doing good work for the cause of temperance in Oregon. Beginning her tour, starting at Ashland, over seven hundred have signed the pledge, and a number of new W. C. T. U's have been organized. On the 13th inst. she held a very enthusiastic meeting at Astoria. On the 14th at Lebanon, she held 38 active and 38 honorary members on the roll of the union. On the 15th she held a meeting at Seaside with 25 active and 25 honorary members. She is a bright, capable speaker, and leaves a very favorable impression wherever she goes. She will lecture to the ladies of the W. C. T. U. at Albany, on tomorrow afternoon, at 2 o'clock, and in the evening to the public. A cordial invitation to attend her lectures is extended to the public in general.

THE PRESIDENT.—Under the present management President Harrison and his family will arrive in Portland Tuesday noon, and hence will probably pass through Albany in the morning of that day. It is not often that we have an opportunity to see an acting President of the United States. R. B. Hayes being the only one to visit this city, hence Albany people will not only en masse, and an effort will be made to have the party stop a short time in Albany. It is probable they will obtain breakfast here, when the popular and hospitable of the depot hotel will have an opportunity to show the Washingtonians what can be done in Oregon in this line, and perhaps secure another watch.

MR. KLINE DEPARTS.—In San Francisco on Wednesday evening, April 15, 1891, Mr. Kline died at the age of about fifty-two years. Mr. Kline came to Albany from California in 1871, and resided here about twenty years, when he removed to Seattle, and thence a few years ago again to California. He was in the general merchandise business here, building up a good business and a good reputation as an honorable business man and citizen. He was a member of the city council and the December election, 1880, was defeated for mayor by David Proctor. Old friends of Albany, who knew Mr. Kline, hear with much regret of his death.

THE PRESBYTERY.—The business meeting of the Willamette Presbytery yesterday consisted of routine work. The overture from the general assembly on the creation of a deaconess was, on motion, lost. One on amending or altering the form of government, book of discipline, and confession of faith, was passed. Rev. A. F. Lot was stationed at Independence, to be installed by Revs. Day, Condit and Elder White. Mrs. M. Rice was recommended to the board of relief for \$100, and Mr. Louis E. Lee, by the committee on education, for aid to the extent of \$100. Dr. Gwynne, Revs. Condit, Prichard, Day and Scott were appointed a permanent committee on examination of candidates. J. H. Bealy was examined as a candidate. It was not sustained, but Mr. Bealy was licensed for one year, with privilege of an examination at any time. The home mission committee recommended the following amounts: Mehama, \$500; Pleasant Grove, Aurora, and Marion, \$550; Crawfordville, \$200; Yaquina Bay, \$575; Lebanon, \$550; Gervais, \$300. The following commissioners were elected to the general assembly, to meet at Detroit. Minister, Rev. Geo. Gillespie, alternate, Rev. E. N. Condit, Elder, J. H. Wilcox, alternate, J. M. Gibson. Rev. S. M. Russell, of Eugene, preached an able sermon in the evening.

ORDINANCE NO. 397.

An ordinance declaring it to be a misdemeanor for any person or persons to keep any hog or hogs within the limits of the city of Albany, and to provide a punishment for such offense.
The people of the city of Albany do ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. Hereafter any person or persons who shall keep, within the corporate limits of the city of Albany, any hog or hogs, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof, before the recorder's court, shall be fined not less than \$5 nor more than \$20, or be imprisoned in the city jail not less than 2 days nor more than 10 days, or by both such fine and imprisonment, at the discretion of the court.

SECTION 2. This ordinance shall be in full force after its approval by the mayor. Passed the council April 14, 1891. Approved April 15, 1891.

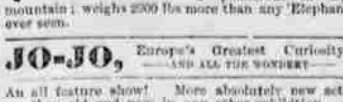
