THE K. OF P. HALL DEDICATED.

The new K of P hall, in the Baltimore block, is a credit to Albany, as those who attended the dedication ceremony last evening, universally testified. It was elegantly decorated and furnished at a cost of over \$1500. The hall is rich in Pythian emblems. The ceiling, papered and frescoed by Mr F Engels, is one of the finest pieces of work in the valley, and the castles and other arrangements display great taste. The rooms were brilliantly lighted by electricity.

The audience was called to order by Chancellor Commander, W H Parker, who delivered a finely worded address of welcome. An opening ode by all the Knights was followed by imposing dedicatory services under charge of Grand Chancellor, A A Cleveland, of Astoria, assisted by O H Irvine, as Vice Grand Chancellor, Geo Hoey, as past grand chancellor, Geo Hochstetler, as grand prelate, Jas F Hall, as grand master at arms, Robt Johnson, as grand keeper of records and seals, and J J DuBunne as grand master of exchequer, while Dr J L Hill and A P Churchill were censor bearers, all in the rich uniforms of their several ranks.

A cornet duet by David Link and S N Steele was artistically executed. Grand Chancellor Cleveland then delivered an oration, telling the beautiful story of Damon and Pythias in elegant language, and of the foundation on friendship, charity and benevolence.

A vocal solo by Rev E R Prichard was greatly appreciated.

Miss Eva Simpson recited "Robert of Roma," displaying superior expression and splendid stage action, receiving many compliments. After a well rendered song by Prof Lee, C W Sears and Fortmiller Bros, Miss Helen Crawford recited "Barbara," in a voice full of richness and with splendid effect.
