ANNUAL MEETING.—The annual meeting of the Albany W. C. T. U. was held last evening at the Hall. The opening exercises consisted of singing by the audience, scripture reading, prayer and a hymn rendered by C. H. Hart and W. Sears. Mrs. E. F. Sox, the retiring president, read an able written address, moving the Union to be in a prosperous condition, with only \$50 now due on the bill of the hall. Mrs. Emily Pitt, of California, delivered an address, full of enthusiasm, portraying in strong language, aided by many pathetic incidents coming under her own observation, the evils of the drink habit. Mrs. Evans is a pleasant speaker, holding the closest attention of her audience. She became enthused like herself twenty new names were received to the Union, now numbering 115. The W. C. T. U. under its able and harmonious management, is a credit to Albany, where it has excited much influence for good.

A PHENOMENA.—On the farm of Blair Fordward, in the Waldo hills, has been found a phenomena. On this place is the lately discovered coal mine, above which Mr. Fordward has sunk a well. In sinking the well, when twenty-seven feet under the ground, hundreds of perfectly formed shells were found, amongst which were clam shells, perfect in form, but examination proved that they are composed of beach sand. It is supposed that after the clams died the shells filled with sand, which took the perfect shape of its cover, when the shell decayed. The indentations and creases are as well defined in the sand as they are on a clam shell. The sand is distinctly of the ocean type, but how came it and these shells in the Waldo hills, covered by twenty-seven feet of soil? These shells are not less than 250 feet above the sea level, and the surrounding country, unlike Eastern Oregon, gives no indication of having been once an inland sea.—Woodburn Independent.

COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

Friday evening, April 17.

Present—Mayor, Recorder, Street Commissioner, Marshal, and Councilmen French, Tabler, Hawkins, Burkhardt.

The recorder reported all the new ordinances signed by the mayor.

Water street was ordered graded and graveled between Sherman and Harrison streets, to be done within thirty days.

A communication from Wm. M. Hoag, of the O. P., in reference to the removal of the old building at the foot of Lyon street, so as to open it to the river, was read and ordered filed.

Asidewalk and crosswalk on First street, between Sherman and Pine sts., were ordered built within ten days.

Ferry street was ordered graded and graveled from Eighth street to city limits, Ninth street from Vine to Broadalbin, Eleventh street from Washington to Ferry. Work to be done in thirty days.

The recorder was directed to notify all property owners between Thurston and Lyon streets and 1st and 9th st., who have not connected with the Railroad street sewer, to do so within ninety days after the city has completed lateral sewers across adjoining streets, if not then done the city to condemn the right of way and do work at cost of property owners.

The street commissioner made several recommendations, referred to committee on streets and public property with power to act.

ORDINANCE NO. 208.

An ordinance relating to certain animals running at large within the limits of the city of Albany, and providing for the taking up, impounding and selling all such animals, when found so running in said city, and to define what shall constitute a running at large of any such animals in said city, to regulate the driving of such animals through the streets and alleys thereof, and to provide for the election of poundmaster, and to regulate his fees and duties:

The people of the city of Albany do ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. Hereafter no horse, mare, jack, jennet, mule, sheep, cow, heifer, bull, calf, hog, or any kind of cattle, shall be allowed to run at large, or to be herded in any of the streets, alleys, or public places in the city of Albany, or upon any private premises therein, except those of the owner or owners of such animals, unless, when being driven through said city for shipment or other purposes, as provided in Section 2, of this ordinance, unless the owner or owners of such animal or animals shall first obtain permission of the owner or person in the control of such private premises, or his agent or the occupant thereof.

SECTION 2. Any person or persons may drive any of the animals mentioned in Section 1, of this ordinance, through any street or alley of said city, for the purpose of shipment or for the purpose of moving such animals from one place to another, taking care, however, that such animal or animals are kept within the streets or alleys of said city, when being so driven or moved therein. And if any person or persons shall drive or move any such animal or animals through said city in such a careless and negligent manner as to allow such animal or animals to do any damage to any person or property therein, such person shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof, before the recorder of the city, shall be fined not less than \$5 nor more than \$20, or imprisoned in the city jail not less than 2 days nor more than 10 days, or be punished by both such fine and imprisonment, at the discretion of the court.

SECTION 3. It is hereby made the duty of the council to elect a suitable person to fill the office of pound master, who shall hold such office during the pleasure of the council, or until his successor is elected and qualified.

SECTION 4. If any of the animals mentioned in Section 1, of this ordinance, shall, at any time, be found running at large within the limits of said city, the same shall be taken up by the pound master, or any other officer or person in the said city, and delivered at once to the pound master, and shall be kept by the pound master in a good and safe place.

SECTION 5. It shall be the duty of the pound master, after taking up of any such animal, as hereinbefore provided, to immediately post up notices in at least three public places in the city for five successive days, giving as correct a description as may be of such animal, including natural and artificial marks thereon and its color, size and apparent age. Said notices shall also contain a statement of the time when and place where such animal will be sold, and upon what terms such sale will be made, if not claimed as hereinafter provided, but such sale shall not take place within less than six days from the date of posting such notices. Such sale shall be for cash in hand, in United States gold coin, and said notices shall so specify, and to the highest bidder at public auction.

SECTION 6. If, before such sale takes place, the owner of such animal shall prove the same to be his, or that he is entitled to the possession thereof, he shall be entitled to take the same upon paying to the pound master the sum of 75 cents per day for each day he shall have kept such animal, after the taking up thereof, and his fees for posting the notices of such sale, and one dollar for such taking up.

SECTION 7. If such animal remains unclaimed until the day of sale thereof, or if the owner or person entitled to the possession thereof fails or refuses to pay the pound master the charges against the same, as herein provided in Section 6, of this ordinance, the pound master shall proceed to sell such animal or animals at the time appointed for such sale, in the manner specified in his legal fees and all costs and expenses of taking up, keeping and selling the same, he shall pay the remainder of the proceeds of such sale to the city treasurer and take his receipt therefor.

SECTION 8. If the owner, or person entitled to the possession of any animal so sold under the provisions of this ordinance, shall, at any time within six months after the date of such sale, make satisfactory proof of his title to such animal or animals to the city council, he shall be entitled to receive the proceeds of such sale on deposit in the city treasury, but if no such proof be made within six months from the date of such sale, such proceeds shall thereafter be the property of the city of Albany.

SECTION 9. A running at large of any animal mentioned herein, within the limits of the city of Albany, for all the purposes of this ordinance, is hereby defined to be the running or being unrestrained, of any such animal in any street or alley in said city, or on any premises therein not owned by, or under the control of the owner or keeper or person in control of such animal.

SECTION 10. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION 11. This ordinance shall take effect and be in full force and effect from and after its approval by the mayor.
