It pays \$5, which gives them
the right of buying goods of all kinds
at prices. Headquarters, Portland,
office in most cases, and proba-
ly is to keep the money and buy of
country men, and you will not only
pay \$5 but considerable besides. It
to make promises but it is an en-
tirely different thing to keep them. It is
a fact that Linn county business
of all kinds cheaper than
houses, and there is no likelihood
that members of such a co-operative
company would get goods at factory
prices. It may be predicted that by the
weight and other expenses were paid
would cost more than where secured
country. Such concerns are un-
likely to run for the benefit of the people
and it is safe to leave them alone.

Simpson, Dr Jones and A Hackleman.
The Presidential party will only stop at
Albany a few moments. On their arrival
at San Francisco they will be formally
extended the hospitality of our citizens by
telegram from the Mayor. There will,
and should, be an immense gathering
present to show the proper respect to the
President of the greatest nation on the
earth. The hour of the arrival of the
party in Albany will be rejoiced in due
time and announced.

ANIMALS WANTED.—The Agricultural
college at Corvallis is getting up a mu-
seum of Zoological specimens, and will pay
a fair price for different kinds of birds and
animals, particularly rare species. A large
series of specimens of "Haploids," Moun-
tain Beaver, are desired, and if in good
pelage 75 cents each will be paid for ten
or more. The same is true of "Lagomys,"
or Little Chief Hare, Pika Hare, Starved
Rat or Coneys. A list of prices paid for
mounted birds and bird skins will be sent
on application. Representative mammals
as prairie dog, wolf, coyote, deer, cougar,
jack rabbit, etc., and good specimens of our
water fowl and land birds, the venomous
and non venomous snakes, turtles, etc, are
desired.

SPEAKING OF LIARS, the editor of the
McClure River, Cal., Pioneer, need not
take a back seat. He says: "Some days
ago a shake maker, who was making
shakes at Black Cox mountain, north of
town, cut down a big five foot sugar pine;
but after telling it discovered to be hollow
some forty feet above the butt. Gazing
into the cavity he found it to be chock
full of bears—five black, seven cinnamon
and three grizzlies—the animals having
holed up for the winter. With great
presence of mind, the man split off some
slabs, sawed off the hollow part, nailed
the slabs over the hole and started the
log down the steep mountain toward the
place where it arrived safe and sound.
The bears can be seen through cracks in
the slabs lying in a state of semi torpor."
