Of course the south gives the president a hearty reception. This is just what might have been expected. But they have something they will not give him. Their electoral vote is reserved for another.

Look out, Mr Blaine, President Harrison talked reciprocity pretty loudly down at Galveston. It would be one of the grotesque whirligigs of politics if Mr Blaine's ammunition should be stolen to make campaign thunder for the Harrison boom, and that both Blaine and Harrison should be pilfering democratic doctrine to fit into a republican platform.

Our republican contemporaries of the protection stamp have often told us that increasing the duties on woolen goods actually makes them cheaper. Now then they are boasting that the removal of duties from sugar will make that article cheaper. But by what course of reasoning they arrive at such contradictory conclusions they do not vouchsafe an explanation. To them it is sufficient if they can induce their readers to believe it.

If any one doubts that the president is on an electioneering tour "swinging around the circle," these doubts will be wholly obliterated by reading the president's speech at Galveston, Texas. His ambition to succeed himself cropped out in every sentence. Notwithstanding there are scores of republicans in every neighborhood who have away of turning their heads towards Mr Blaine when presidential probabilities are suggested. Blaine is a much larger man than Harrison, and this accounts for his shrewd way of avoiding the collapse that in the near future awaits the scheme of protectionism, and this he does by switching off on the side track of reciprocity. Reciprocity is the sheerest kind of free trade so far as it goes. Mr Blaine is too nervous in the presence of McKinley and McKinleyism to expand it very much, nevertheless it is the entering wedge that will cleave the protection scheme in twain.

The republican league of the United States held its convention at Cincinnati on Tuesday. Ex-governor Foraker made a speech in the course of which he spoke of Blaine "as the greatest living American," and as "having given us a magnificent administration." Friends of Harrison from Indiana were highly offended at the "treatment accorded President Harrison," in thus entirely ignoring him. They threatened to call a meeting of Indiana delegates to denounce Foraker and Blaine's friends, but the matter was finally smothered out, still the wound remains unhealed. That a very bitter feeling is growing up between the friends of the man with a large head and the friends of the man with a large hat is evidenced from the aggressive manner of the friends of Blaine. Many republicans feel that the Harrison administration has, in many respects, been a failure, and they now look around for a new leader and Blaine seems to be the only choice with such.

BEEF CULTURE.

Mr G W Wright, President of the Board of Trade of Albany, has handed us the following letter which explains itself:

PORTLAND, April 17th 1891.

Dear Sir: As you are doubtless aware, through the press, there is a movement to have an experiment made in the raising of sugar beets in this state, in order to ascertain at what cost they can be produced, and an analysis made of the beets grown, to ascertain their richness in saccharine matter. Believing that the production of the sugar would be a matter of very great benefit to the state, I have procured seed for experimental purposes of what are reputed to be the best varieties. I send you herewith by express a small quantity of each; that is, the "Klein Wanzleben" and the "Vilmoin's Improved." I also mail herewith instructions for planting and cultivating the beets, as furnished me by E H Dyer, of Alvarado, Cal., who is an authority on this subject. I would request that you distribute this seed to some of your most reliable farmers, who will take interest in the matter and will follow the instructions. Between now and the time for harvesting the beets, I will endeavor to have all arrangements made for the analysis of the beets to ascertain their value in sugar. I would also ask that you request the parties to whom you give the seed to keep a careful record of the matter, so that they will be able, at the time of turning in the beets, to furnish a statement of the quantity in weight, per acre, their experiments produced, and at what cost they were grown. It is to be hoped that these experiments will prove that the beets can be produced in this state at a cost, and of a quality, that will enable the sugar manufacturing industry to be established. Trusting that you will be able to give this matter the requisite attention, I have the honor to be,

SUSTAINED.

L. E. BLAIN'S COLUMN.

"The DEMOCRAT Sustained" is the way the Albany DEMOCRAT heads the news of the decision of the Oregon supreme court in the Tillamook wagon road case, which, by the way, it cites from the Statesman's columns without credit. This is almost as presumptuous as another equally obscure paper claiming the credit of obtaining the passage of most of the bills by the last legislature.—Statesman.

The reason the DEMOCRAT claims to be sustained is, that prior to the meeting of the legislature in 1889, when the fact crept out that combinations were being formed to loot the treasury of the state by passing a dozen or more wagon road bills, this paper was the first and only one to protest against the passage of them on the ground of their unconstitutionality and specifically referred to subdivision 7, Section 23, Article 4 of the constitution, as inhibiting the passage of such laws. This protest was made again by the DEMOCRAT when the late legislature was about to convene and it became apparent that similar combinations were to be made in the interests of wagon roads. During the two sessions of the legislature referred to the DEMOCRAT continued to protest in the name of taxpayers against these unconstitutional bills. So far as we know the Statesman never uttered any such protest but let the whole scheme go on to consummation without raising its voice against it. It was in this way that the position of the DEMOCRAT was sustained. As to not giving credit to the Statesman, we have only to say that a syllabus and decision of a supreme court are common, and public property and no newspaper is required or expected to give credit for them. The Statesman in the first place took the decision from the records of the supreme court without giving credit for them.
