J A Douthit, editor of the Ochoco Review, was arrested last week on complaint of D W Aldridge, of the News, on the charge of criminal libel, the Review having charged Aldridge with having tried to outrage Mrs Salomon, a highly respectable citizen, and a girl named Lottie Waller. Douthit was examined before Justice Bell, M E Brink and H F Nicholls appearing for the prosecution, and Barnes and Moore for the defense. He was discharged, and in the next issue the Review reiterates the charges, declaring they were fully proven in the trial. Thus the war goes on.

We rather like the Swiss style of taxation, not because it would be of great benefit to newspaper men, but because in it there would be some justice. The rich men have to pay the taxes, which is correct. The poorer man is the less proportionately his rate of taxation. That is, we will say, if a man is worth \$100,000, and the rate of taxation is two per cent, he has to pay \$2000. If he is worth but \$50,000, he will pay, not \$1000, but \$750. If worth \$25,000 he will pay but \$500, and so on down to \$500, when he scarcely pays anything. Then, everybody makes his own assessment, but after a man's death the government carefully investigates his estate, and if he has been defrauding the treasury, it collects the back taxes with interest.

The cry of dull times becomes epidemic, and you hear it often without reason. Money is as plentiful now as ever at this time of the year. There is in fact more in the banks than last year at this time. Considerable of it is moving. There is a feeling, though, against loaning it on uncertain risks, and conservative men are allowing it to lie idle rather than do so.
