COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

Tuesday evening, April 28. Present—Recorder, Marshal, Superintendent of streets, and Councilmen French, Tabler, Burkhardt and Garrett.

In the absence of the Mayor Councilman Burkhardt was elected Mayor pro tem.

The following bills were ordered paid: John Schmeer, \$5; W B Barr, \$80.75; B M Huston & Co, \$5.50; Thos Brink, \$5; Stewart & Sox, \$3; Hewitt & Irvine, \$100; Geo Stimpson, \$7.50; Mr King, \$8.75; Mason & Strang, \$384.98; Henry East, \$1; C E House, \$7; E T Hughes, \$5; W A McClain, \$60; John Jones, \$70; Smith & Watson, of Portland, \$7.

In matter of petition of W W Crowder and others for grading 6th street, Montgomery to Jefferson, parties interested were directed to appear at the next meeting and show cause why work should not be done.

Further time was granted on petitions to remove obstruction at foot of Lyon street and to straighten Salem road. Also on matters of recommendations for street improvements.

The committee on fire and water asked for further time on matter of cistern at 3rd and Jackson streets and of horses for steamers. They recommended that four cisterns be cleaned instead of cemented at present, and also recommended that a committee be appointed to confer with Wm M Hoag in reference to putting in a more complete system of water mains and hydrants. On motion report was adopted. F M French, W H Garrett and Chief Engineer Stewart were appointed committee recommended.

Superintendent of streets made a large number of recommendations for sidewalk and other improvements, including cleaning of streets and alleys. Streets, First street, Washington to Lyon, side streets Ferry to Lyon, between First and Second streets, and all alleys were ordered cleaned, former in five days, latter in ten days. Remainder of report referred.

Petition of J G Crawford and ors asked that grade along Water street, Main to Harrison, be lowered and that same be ordered graded. On motion granted, and ordinances ordered amended to conform to order.

Ordinance 267 regulating taxation of dogs, etc, was read third time and passed unanimously.

On motion a pound master was elected. Mr Frank Trites was unanimously elected.

The chairman of the committee on streets made several recommendations, to be considered.

The matter of a city jail was referred to the committee on health and police.

The matter of a fire alarm system was discussed and referred to committee on fire and water and Chief Engineer.
