

"HILL DISSATISFIED."

Under the above caption the St. Louis Republic has a despatch from Washington city saying that the democratic members of congress who have been over in New York for the past few weeks, and are now sojourning in Washington preparatory to starting for their homes, bring a good deal of political gossip from that state. From all accounts David B Hill is very much dissatisfied regarding his present political situation. Mr Hill tried to play a very fine game when he accepted the senatorship, but things did not work his way and he is very much put out about it. As the story goes Hill only wanted the senatorship for the prestige it would give him in a national way and had no intention of ever qualifying. He fully expected that Harrison would call an extra session of the senate to confirm his judicial nominations, and then Hill intended to resign and permit the present legislature of New York to elect Smith M Weed to the senate. Much to Hill's disgust, however, he discovered within a week after the adjournment of congress on the 4th of March, that Harrison did not intend to call an extra session of the senate and then, to use Hill's own classic phrase, he found himself in a hole. His idea was to resign the senatorship and run for a third term as governor. The failure of Harrison to call an extra session of the senate deprived Hill of his opportunity of resigning the senatorship. This cuts him off from running for a third term for governor, as the next legislature of New York may have a republican majority and Hill dare not face the country by declining to go to the senate and make room for a republican.

Hill feels when he surrenders the governorship of New York he will lose his hold on the machine in that state; that he will be lost sight of in the senate, as there are several democrats so much bigger than he is there, and by the time the national convention meets next year that he will be a nonentity. He feels reasonably certain that he has such control of the machine that if he desired another nomination for governor he would get it, and that with a solid support of the saloon and whiskey elements behind him he could be re-elected, but the senatorship is in his way. He has got it by the tail and he cannot let go. If he should let go of the senatorship the next legislature might be republican, and, of course, would elect a republican. Giving away a senatorship like this would forever damn Hill. The next legislature of New York will be democratic, but the convention to nominate the next governor of New York will be held in the fall, long before the elections, and Hill, as a democrat, cannot afford to run any chances of giving the senatorship to the republicans.

MORE FALSE REASONING.

Now that all farm products are creeping upwards in price, and the manufactured necessities of life are becoming cheaper, our alliance friends are called upon to explain the situation but cannot. The alliance was organized to give the farmer cheaper manufactured products and sell his own at a higher price. The object has been fulfilled without any action on the part of the alliance. Who has been keeping prices down? Why have the organizations of farmers had such an influence on the markets? The question will not answer itself and until we see how permanent are the prices, we are not capable of answering with any certainty.—West Side.

This is intended to show that farmers are benefited by protectionism. The argument is that increasing the duty on farm products has enabled the farmer to sell his products for better prices. At the same time it is said that increasing the duties on manufactured necessities of life enables the consumer to buy them cheaper. But the farmer is no longer to be deceived by such false reasoning.

THE SUGAR TARIFF.

Isn't it a trifle rough to blame the republicans and protectionists for the existence of the sugar tariff, in view of the fact that the McKinley bill has removed the duty from sugar and placed it upon the free list?—S. F. Chronicle.

The trouble with the McKinley bill lies in the fact that McKinley saw fit to discriminate in favor of the sugar refiners of this country by putting raw sugar on the free list and protecting refined sugar. This enables the refiners of this country to organize and maintain their trusts.

Miss Mary Breckinridge, daughter of Congressman Breckinridge, of Kentucky, is not satisfied with being a social belle at the capital, and has begun the study of law in her father's office. Miss Breckinridge is pretty and popular, and it goes without saying that she is a sensible girl and will make a good lawyer.

A permanent and durable joint can be made between rough cast-iron surfaces by the use of mineral asbestos mixed with sufficient white lead to make a very stiff putty. This will resist any amount of heat, and is unaffected by steam or water. It has been employed for mending or closing cracks in cast-iron retorts, used in the distillation of oil gas from canal coal.

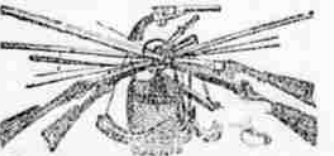

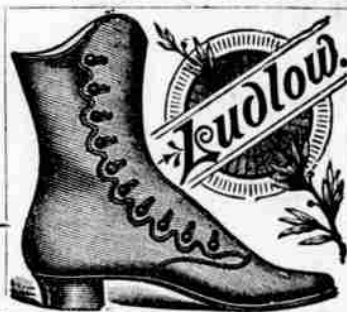
