In Switzerland a Sunday law has been enacted applying to all railroad, steamboat and tramway companies and postoffices. Working time must not be more than twelve hours a day, even on occasions of increased traffic. Engine and train men must have at least ten hours unbroken rest, and other employees nine hours. They must also have fifty two days off yearly, and seventeen of these must be Sundays. No reduction in wages is to be made for such rest days. All freight traffic on Sunday is prohibited, except live stock.

At a great sale of rare books in New York recently, a Mazarin Bible brought \$14,800. It is curious how wealthy men love to waste money to secure what has no advantage except in rarity. A better Bible for use could be bought for five dollars. It is noted that the interest on the sum thus wasted will more than pay the average salary of the preachers of this country who promulgate the truth that alone gives the Bible its value.

It is intimated at Washington that Justices Bradley and Field of the United States Supreme court will resign next fall. If they do President Harrison will have two more important judicial positions to fill, and if he has not been misrepresented he will make those appointments subservient to his ambition for a renomination. He will not, therefore, as guessed, appoint Senator Edmunds of Vermont to the bench. Senator Edmunds has contempt for James G. Blaine and would not be a serviceable cog in the Blaine Harrison machine. Moreover, if the reason given by the Vermont senator for resigning his seat in the senate be valid he cannot reside in Washington.

"Over too tools and processes which are marvels of ingenuity and scientific knowledge," says the Rochester (N. Y.) Democrat, "have been invented by safe burglars. A recent burglar's outfit, captured by the police, consisted of a little giant knob-breaker, a diamond drill and a high explosive of the nature of dynamite, but put up in the form of a powder. It would open the strongest bank safe in a half-hour, and without noise enough to disturb people in the next house, while the entire outfit could be carried in the pockets of an ordinary coat."

It is strange that the era of prosperity which the McKinley bill was to inaugurate for workingmen should be opened with bitter conflicts between employers and employees. Mr. McKinley and his friends certainly said that the bill would enable employers in protected industries to make greater profits, and thus enable them to give better wages to their men. Has it failed to enable the protected employers to make greater profits, or have they failed to take advantage of the opportunity their increased profits afford to pay better wages? Can it be possible that, despite the magnanimity of the government, employers insist upon paying their workmen no more than they are compelled to pay under the law of competition? There must have been juggling somewhere, and an explanation from McKinley is desirable.

BEE SEED

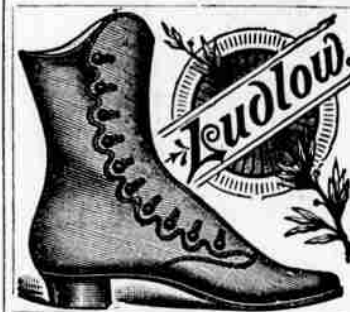
