COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

Was Ordered Advertised for, for a High Steel Bridge.

Tuesday evening, May 12. Present.—Mayor, Recorder, Marshal, Street Superintendent, Chief Engineer and Councilmen Hawkins, Burkhardt, Tabler, Smith, Garrett, French, and a large number of citizens.

The following bills were ordered paid: N. J. Henton, \$75; Smith & Sander, \$7; Wm. Wright, \$73.50; J. W. Reece, \$3; A. J. Ansly, \$29; Chas. Metzger, \$1.50; H. E. Townsend, \$2.50; Fosbury & Mason, \$45; W. B. Barr, \$58; Cost bills, \$14.75; O. P. Dunneals, \$15; Geo. Hughes, \$1; Electric Light Co., \$182.05; C. O. Lee, \$70; freight bill, \$0 cents.

Bill of J. A. Warner, \$45, disallowed. All obstructions on Lyon street from 1st street to Willamette river were ordered removed, before May 21st, at 7:30 p. m. the time for hearing objections to said order.

Further time was granted in matter of city jail; also on cleaning of cisterns.

The committee on fire and water recommended an arrangement with A. B. Lacy and Frank Purdon for hauling the two steamers to fires night and on Sundays, for rent of house to reside in and the furnishing of fire harness, at a permanent cost of about \$25 a month. Referred to committee of whole to report at next meeting.

The surveyor submitted the following report on sewerage system for the city: By request I submit to your honorable body the following approximate estimate for the completion of the sewerage system of the city:

Three sewers in Western portion of city, 12, 15 and 8 inch pipe, with necessary man-holes, each 2401.00 \$7204.00 One main sewer through business portion of city, 18 inch pipe, 2333 feet, @ \$2.20 per foot \$5132.60

This does not include any sewers already contracted, or any the construction of which has been contracted for. Respectfully submitted W. B. BARR, City Surveyor.

On motion report was placed on file. Lateral sewers connecting with Railroad street sewer were ordered built according to notice published.

Petition of A. Hackleman and 508 others asked that the city unite with the county in the building of a bridge across the Willamette river at Ellsworth street, as provided by the action of the county court.

Mr. Burkhardt moved that the petition be granted. The mayor declared the motion out of order. On motion the petition was placed on file.

Ordinance bill No. 220 establishing certain grades of the streets of Albany was read three times and passed.

Councilman Burkhardt offered a resolution providing for a special meeting on Friday, May 15, 1891, for the purpose of taking a vote of the citizens of Albany on the location of a bridge at Ellsworth or Calapooia streets. Mr. French moved to lay the resolution on the table; aye—French, Tabler, Garrett, No—Hawkins, Smith, Burkhardt. The mayor voted aye, laying the resolution on the table.

The committee on streets and public property made numerous recommendations. On motion adopted. See notice hereafter published.

On motion it was ordered that when the council adjourn it be to meet on May 21, 1891, at 7:30 p. m.

Mr. Garrett moved that the recorder forward at once to the secretary of war at Washington, the plans, as prepared by the engineer, for a high steel bridge, as provided by law, for approval by the government.

It was moved by French that the recorder advertise at once for bids for the construction of a high steel bridge at the location of the site selected by the joint committees, bids to be opened on June 12, from 1 to 2 p. m. Aye—3; no—3. The mayor cast the deciding vote in favor of the motion. Mayor Cowan, on voting, stated that he had the assurance of one of the county commissioners that in case of such an action, he would stand in with the city in constructing it.

Cheers for and against were frequent during the different bridge motions. A lateral sewer was ordered connecting with Calapooia street sewer; also lateral sewer connecting with Railroad street sewer, to have hearing on 21st inst.

Bad holes in streets from which dirt was recently scraped were ordered filled with gravel.
