A BIG CONTRACT.—The Albany Wire Works is proving a factory of considerable importance. Besides its already good business the factory has just secured an order from two large Portland houses for one hundred wire mattresses a day for a year, about 30,000 in all. Considerable new machinery has been introduced, seven or eight of wire, 70 tons, some of which has already been received, ordered. Ten or fifteen hands will be kept constantly in motion to meet these contracts and the general business of the factory.

A SMALL BLAZE.—About 10 o'clock last evening a fire was discovered in the shed in the rear of the old Young store, now occupied by the juvenile band, and the department was called out. It burned some under the floor and was extinguished without much trouble. Appearances indicated that it was an accident, but just how is not known. None of the band boys had been in it during the evening. The door to the shed on the alley was easily entered, offering a good place for tramps to sleep.

The capital stock paid in is \$60,000; surplus fund, \$9,600; undivided profits, \$2,273.30; individual deposits, \$84,627.28; demand certificates, \$4,185.34.

On the contrary, he expects to return to Oregon early in the summer and look after the interests of the state and fortify himself for the strong fight he expects to make in her behalf next winter. THE SHEDD SUICIDE.

Some Sensational Features in It.

Coroner Farrell and Justice Humphrey returned last evening from Shedd, where the Coroner held an inquest over the body of Mrs. Carrie Young. The jury consisted of J. W. Ellison, J. W. Burton, Jas. R. Davis, Wm. Miller, Jas. May and Geo. H. Burnett. Three witnesses were called, F. E. Adams, Geo. W. Davis and Dr. Gaff. The testimony showed that Mrs. Young was in the habit of getting up at 6. When 7 o'clock came Mr. Adams, who was working for her, tapped on her door. Mrs. Young's little girl told him to go down stairs. Thinking something was the matter Mr. Adams called out. Geo. W. Davis and the two effected an entrance into her room. Mrs. Young was found lying on her left side, with a 32 caliber revolver at her left temple in her hand, and a bullet hole at the point of the revolver. The bullet entered the cranium an inch and a half back of the orbit, going through the parietal bone, and lodging in the upper edge of the temporal bone. Five loads remained in the weapon. A letter addressed to her mother, Mrs. Cooper, asked her to pay her debts, give her a decent burial, and asked, if she had been cross to her, to forgive her, as she hoped God to. Also to give a ring on her finger to George E. Hackberry as a keepsake. The jury found that she came to death by a pistol shot fired by her own hand. Two letters addressed to Jack Andrews, East Portland, an S. P. railroad freight conductor, were also found on her stand, with postage stamps. A bottle of chloroform and a bottle of hair oil, though labeled poison, were near by. The little girl was stupefied and the indications were that the mother had endeavored to smother her with chloroform, a saturated handkerchief being found, her husband recently having tried to get the child. Had the letters to Mr. Andrews been opened, in all probability they would have revealed the cause of her death and perhaps added sensation to the affair. During the illness of Conductor Huston on the Roseburg local Mr. Andrews had taken his place, and the DEMOCRAT is informed that Mrs. Young went to Roseburg for a day or two, going and returning on his train, having only returned a few days before the tragedy. Just what this signifies is of course speculation until the facts in the case are learned, if they ever are.

Observations of "Chronic Grumbler."

ROWLAND, May 10, 1891.
Editors Democrat: Thinking perhaps that a few notes from this part of the commonwealth might be acceptable, I will pen a line or two to you this morning. Yesterday was a gala day with Harrisburg grange, it being the day appointed by that grange for an open or informal meeting, the hour for meeting being 11 o'clock. By that time quite a goodly number of Patrons, together with several that were not of "the household of the faithful," had congregated, and the meeting was called to order by the worthy P. M. E. E. Upmyer, who stated briefly the object of the meeting. He also stated that the meeting would be addressed by some of "our ablest speakers," which sounded more like sarcasm from the fact that the first one called was the "Grumbler." But the object of this was obvious, for the next speaker called was Hon. R. A. Irvine, of your city, who held the audience in rapt attention for something like an hour, with one of his characteristic grange speeches, the contrast between the two being so marked that Bro. Upmyer's sarcasm stood out in bold relief.

Bro. Irvine set forth in glowing terms the struggles and triumphs of the grange for the last twenty-four years, together with the obstacles that the order had to surmount to reach the proud distinction that it claims today, of being the foremost order for the elevation and advancement of the condition of the agricultural classes, giving due credit to those other orders and associations for the part they are taking in trying to ameliorate the condition of the laboring and producing classes.

At the close of Bro. Irvine's remarks the sisters of Harrisburg grange announced dinner. It is not necessary to elaborate on this, as it was well—it was a grange dinner, and nearly everybody knows what that means. After dinner and an hour of social converse, the house was called to order, and Bro. Wm. Power was called out and made some very pointed remarks setting forth what the grange had done in a business way.

At the conclusion of Bro. Power's remarks Bro. Thomas Froman, of Grand Prairie No. 10, was called out and stated in glowing terms what the grange had done in an educational way for the farmers, illustrating the point by his own case saying that when he first joined the grange he could not say "Worthy Master" without trembling in his boots, but now Bro. Froman hardly knows where to stop when he gets started.

Sister Powers, of Oak Plain, read an article on the political situation that was terse and to the point.

Rev. Potter, of Pleasant Hill Lane Co., was present and remarked that he believed the dinner the sisters had prepared was "musty," as after eating one grange dinner he must have another.

After remarks by Bro. Miller, of Charity, and various others the meeting adjourned, all seeming to feel that the day had been well spent.
