Warner Miller has returned to Washington with a glowing account of the work being done on Nicaragua canal. Treasurer Nebeker, who is at home in Indiana, should rush to the capital at once and stand guard with a shotgun over that \$100,000,000 of gold reserve.

Ex-Senator Ingalls, having planted his potatoes, has hung up his shovel and his hoe and will spend the time from now until the potato-bugs are thick in lecturing to the great American public. This is the cup of hope dashed once more from the lip and belief that the ex-senator had settled down with a determination to lead a useful life proved fallacious.

The reports from sixteen principal wheat-growing counties of Kansas say the wheat is turning yellow from some unknown cause, and these counties will not yield more than one-half to two-thirds of a crop. Reno county reports much damage from a Hessian fly. A new bug appears in several counties where the wheat is turning yellow. Several counties report a damage from drought.

Russell Harrison's paper renews the assurance to the country that Russell Harrison's father is a great man, and that it is he and not Blaine that has given us this "splendid administration" so justly praised by Foraker. According to *Frank Leslie's Newspaper*, Blaine simply amounts to nothing. Here is a mere amanuensis for the little gentleman in the White House, who attends to everything himself, including the foreign relations as well as the financial policy. In short, Blaine is not in it. All of which is calculated still further to encourage kindly feeling in the party.

"In God we trust" first appeared on the copper two-cent issue of 1864, and is the first use of the word God in any government act. This sentence was introduced by James Pollock, an ex-governor of Pennsylvania, director of the mint, with the approval of S. P. Chase, then secretary of the treasury. It appeared on the 1866 issue of the double-eagle, half-eagle, silver dollar, half-dollar and nickel five-cent piece, in lieu of the long-existing motto of *E Pluribus Unum*. In the trade-dollar issue (1873) both mottoes were retained, "In God we trust" appearing on the obverse.

"The chance is a rare one. I can't touch it—but I obey my first and best impulse in offering it to you," is the way Mr. Blaine put the Northern Pacific speculation to his friend Fisher. And again: "My object in writing is to ask in season if any of our friends would desire to establish a bank in Little Rock. It will be to some extent a matter of favoritism who gets the banks in several localities, and it will be in my power to cast an anchor to the windward in your behalf if you desire it." This is the kind of diplomacy that is now being illustrated in behalf of the Elkins syndicate. Mr. Blaine is very evidently obeying his first and best impulses again.

CANNOT DO THE MISCHIEF

A few weeks ago newspapers pretending to be democratic only that they may injure democratic interests were telling how the democratic party was going to be split on the silver question, and how men's views on that subject were going to make them available or unavailable as candidates.

But The World then demonstrated the diminutiveness of silver as an issue in comparison with greater and more pressing ones, and exposed the malignity behind the weak schemes of division fostered by the enemy. Now everybody is of the same mind, and silverites and anti-silverites, north, south, east and west, vie with each other in assurances that silver will not be a disturbing element in the next democratic convention.

Again, the same newspapers are rating Mills as a free trader and Crisp as a protectionist, in the ardent hope of running a tariff wedge through the party in the next house. But they will succeed no better with this than they did with silver. Mills is not a more radical tariff reformer than Crisp, and neither is more radical than the democratic party. Either would fill the speakership with distinguished ability and perfect satisfaction to the country. And if either should fail of nomination for any reason whatever, a comfortable list of illustrious names remains to choose from: Wilson, Springer, Bynum, McMillin, Outhwaite and Hatch, with a large reserve unnecessary to mention. No party was ever before so rich in unexceptionable material for this high office, and never was there less opportunity for faction to assert itself.

The mischief-makers will not accomplish their purpose. They must find some other point to put the knife in. The democracy will not divide either upon tariff or upon silver.

THE ENTERING WEDGE.

That McKinley protectionism is the entering wedge that will ultimately cleave the republican party in twain is foreshadowed by such expressions as the following from the *Chicago Tribune*, the leading republican paper in the west:

Reciprocity and an American marine are what are needed to "revive and extend American commerce." President Harrison sees it, and he has become an ardent, uncompromising supporter of Mr. Blaine's policies on these subjects. He has cut loose from Chinese Wall McKinleyism, which recognizes the home market only and tells the American farmer and manufacturer that they must confine themselves to that though it deprives them of a chance of disposing on good terms of price-reducing surpluses. The president and Mr. Blaine are working in perfect harmony. That they are doing so disgusts the discredited chumps of last November, but it is the salvation of the republican party, which those chumps came so near everlastingly wrecking.

According to the *New York Sun* Mr. Mills of Texas is not a tariff reformer, but a free trader, and the same organ says that he was around on the stump last fall hurling the democratic party when he ought to have been in his seat at Washington. The people of this section will remember having heard such talk as this during the campaign last fall, coupled with the prophecy that Mills would be defeated by the wool growers of his district. Yet there was a victory all along the line in the states of the northwest where Mr. Mills was said by the *Sun* to have been injuring the democratic party. Let the *Sun* stick to its republican masters. Democrats have no use for the sheet.
