CRACK COUNTY.—Orders on the county for witness and jury fees have been selling at 30 cents on the dollar. This is about 2 1/2 cents lower than they have gone at heretofore.

It is reported that wool buyers are offering 18 cents per pound for choice wool in the Dalles. If this is true wool will likely go to 20 or 21 cents before it is all sold.

On Tuesday Edward Barnes, of Mitchell, was examined before County Judge Sumner as to his sanity, and on the recommendation of Dr V. Gesner was adjudged insane.

One day last week a fire occurred at Wm Hogan's place on Silver creek, 75 miles east of Prineville, destroying his house and barn and all the contents.

James Jones, who was indicted for aiding the Magee boys to escape after the killing of Lee Annis, was the happiest man in town Tuesday evening when the jury which tried his case rendered a verdict of not guilty.

On Tuesday afternoon M. A. Carson's barn, on Crooked river, 40 miles east of Prineville, was burned, destroying Mr Carson's wagon, agricultural implements and about 40 tons of hay.

Nature has again been kind to this section in sending a fine shower of rain last Tuesday evening. It revived the drooping grain as well as the drooping spirits of the farmers whose grain was frosted last week.—Review.

INTERVIEWED.—In view of the fact that Mr C. J. Sturt, of the Oregon Pacific, does not pretend to give newspapers O.P. news except in his special field, the following from the Salem Statesman will be of interest: "C. J. Sturt, of Albany, traveling freight and passenger agent of the Oregon Pacific, was in the city yesterday. He was seen by a Statesman reporter and interviewed in regard to the outlook for future action of his company. He was of the opinion that work would soon begin again on the extension of the road. He was rather sanguine over the fact that his company would be able to make all financial arrangements necessary to carry out the proposed work, and further stated that the company was more fully alive to the advantages that would accrue to the people living along the proposed route, than the people themselves.

A CAPT. REPRIMANDED.—Capt Sladden of E. Co., of Eugene, a few months ago was taken before the department officers, charged with conduct unbecoming an officer, which consisted in unclothing a recruit for membership, placing him on a barrel, and refusing him admission to the company on ridiculous grounds. Col Lovell has just issued an order severely reprimanding Capt Sladden. "The offense alleged in the first specification," reads the order, "of which only Capt Sladden was found guilty, was admitted to be an indecent joke, such as no officer of the National Guard should participate in, more especially when on duty. Such conduct is prejudicial to discipline, and Capt Sladden is hereby severely reprimanded." Geo. O. Yorani was also reprimanded for disobedience of orders.

MILL CITY.—Al Gates, who crossed the summit of the Cascade Mountains on the 13th, reports the snow as being about three miles in width.

There is every indication that the Oregon Pacific will get a move on it this summer and build across the mountains.

COMMERCIAL IMPORTANCE.—This morning six engines were in the city at noon time. There were three freight engines met here, an engine with a pile driver, a passenger train and the yard line were congregated in the vicinity of the Southern Pacific depot at 11 o'clock. Thus it is seen that Salem is coming a city of commercial importance.—Journal. If six engines make a commercial city, what will ten to twelve engines in Albany at one time not notified, as it is a daily occurrence.

AFTER OIL.—The Hubbard oil boom is dead, although it has been sleeping. A material engine, etc., are on the ground and within ten days boring will commence. They will sink down 100 feet before rigging a derrick. If necessary they will go down 2000 feet, as well as to be sunk near the well. The oil was first discovered.—Wood Independent.
