

ATTORNEY GENERAL.—The governor today appointed Hon George E Chamberlain, of this city, to the office of attorney general of the state, a new office created by an act of the last legislature. The office is a very important and responsible one, and the governor evidently had this in view when he made this selection. Mr Chamberlain fully fills the measure of the Jeffersonian test. He is capable, eminently so, and scrupulously honest and exact in his intercourse with his fellow men. His appointment will be endorsed by the people of Linn county—who know him best—without regard to party. Mr Chamberlain came to this state from Mississippi about sixteen years ago and settled in Albany where he has since resided. He studied law at the Virginia law school, and was admitted to the bar of that state when quite young. He served one term in the lower house of the Oregon legislature, to which he was elected in 1880, and was elected district attorney in the 3rd judicial district in 1884 against an adverse majority of 800. The governor has done well in making this appointment.

THE STATE SHOOT.—The indications are now for a large attendance at the shooting tournament which will be held in this city Friday and Saturday of this week. A club of shooters will come down from Albany. The Yaquina Rod and Gun club will probably be on hand, and in addition to these two or three clubs will be represented from Portland. From that place will come some crack shots in the persons of W J Riley, J Evans, E Hughes, Herman, Burrill, W Storey and George Clark. Salem Journal. Those who will enter the tournament from Albany are M Weigant, William Jones, L W Deyoe, W E Baker, Matt Monteith and perhaps one or two others. Practice shooting is indulged in very afternoon on the flats under the alapooia street bridge.

NO FOOT PADS.—The report that a man was knocked down and robbed of a watch and some money, last evening, the Democrat learns, is entirely unfounded. There are probably no foot pads in Albany, which is not and never has been that kind of a city. A young man—as the story is told the Democrat—became intoxicated at a saloon where his money and watch disappeared; at least he had to watch on leaving it. It is doubted if he knew very much what he was doing in his way home. And, in any event, there were foot pads around, he is not man they would attack.

EAST WATER STREET.—The people at the east end of Water street are setting a good example to the rest of the world by harmoniously building a bridge across the ravine that runs through that section of the city. It will be for horses and people, and is a much needed improvement. That part of Albany is gradually going ahead, everybody being willing to do something to help things along.

BASE BALL EXCURSION.—Next Saturday the Albany and Corvallis clubs will play a game of base ball at Lyons, on the O. P., where there is a good ground and as well good picnicking facilities. The game has been made the drawing card for an excursion. The train will leave Albany at 8:30 o'clock a. m. Fare for the round trip will be only 50 cents for adults and 25 cents for children.

A LIVE RUNAWAY occurred this morning at 7:30. The ice wagon team of John Isom, jr., took a rattling spin down Broadalbin street, turning up the railroad track at Water street, the wagon turning over twice, tearing the cover into shreds and breaking every spring in the wagon.

No appointment will be made of second judge of the first district under the act of the last legislature, holding that the law is invalidated by the record of the lower house, which discloses the fact that the enacting clause was added after the bill had passed both houses. The governor having applied to the supreme court for its opinion upon the law without success, there being no provision of law in this state requiring such opinion to be given, felt compelled to exercise his own judgment as to the validity of the law, and therefore refuses to issue a commission.
