CONTRACT LET.—The contract for building the U. P. Church, above the foundation, excepting glass for the windows, seats, furnace and painting, has been let to Mr. F. C. Conn, the lowest bidder. The cost of the church when completed will approximate \$15,000. Mr. Conn built the Central school building and many other prominent buildings in the county, and may be depended on to do a good job. It was intended to change the original plans, but this was not done, and the contract was let under the bids on the same as originally provided by the architect.

A FINE PAINTING.—The members of the O. F. lodge of this city, has been greatly adding to their outfit for lodge work during the past week. Yesterday they received a large box of new paraphernalia, and on the same day several paintings were turned over to them by the artist, A. W. Best. One of them, a landscape scene, is 8x14 feet in dimension, being one of the largest oil paintings in the valley. A river in the foreground and the ocean in the distance, with nature everywhere in her elements. The picture is an attractive one. Then there are two combination scenes, rocks, etc., in black.

A SINGULAR ACCIDENT.—A rather singular railroad accident occurred between Halsey and Muddy last Monday. The repair train of the Western Union line was being pulled by the way freight when one of the cars caught fire from the engine. The fire caught in the cook room of the car, and as there was considerable grease on everything, the whole interior was soon ablaze. The train was quickly uncoupled and the burning car set out alone, and just in time, as it contained a quantity of powder and dynamite, which ignited and scattered the debris promiscuously. Hubbard, who bought an interest in the business for \$2500, on the 18th, but the creditors are not satisfied with the deal and allege fraudulent intentions on the part of the assignors. A petition was accordingly circulated among the creditors yesterday asking Judge Stearns to call a meeting of the creditors to enable them to select their own assignee. They allege that only by so doing are they able to protect their own rights. The assets of the firm are placed at \$26,000. Mr. Arch Monteith, formerly of Albany, is the junior member of the firm.
