Manufactured coffee exactly resembling the genuine bean is the latest swindle. The Philadelphia market is flooded with this spurious article.

The reports coming from all parts of the grain belt read to the effect that indications of the greatest grain crop known in the history of the country are becoming continually more apparent.

The total of periodical publications now issued in the United States and Canada is 19,373. In frequency of issue they are divided as follows: Weekly, 14,000; monthly, 2625; daily, 1791; semi-monthly, 327; semi-weekly, 238; quarterly, 180; bi-weekly, 90; bi-monthly, 76; tri-weekly, 46.

The lowest rate on record, five cents a bushel, is being charged for carrying wheat from Chicago to New York. The grain is taken by lake to Buffalo, thence by tide water to the Erie Canal. The lake boats get 1 1/2 cents, the Buffalo elevators seven-eighths of a cent and the Erie Canal boats the remainder.

WHAT MCKINLEY DID.

When hard pressed, the protectionists will fall back upon the defense that McKinley put sugar on the free list. And they even say that "far from taxing or levying duties on the necessities of life, the aim of the republican party has been to reduce the duty or put upon the free list all articles of real necessity or raw material." This is a statement made by Porter, the man who tried to take the census of the United States but made such a bungling of it. A political party is better judged by what it does than by what individual members of that party say it does or will do. Below we give a list of the articles which McKinley in his graciousness put on the free list. Run over them and see how many of them are real necessities of life:

Acorns, unground. Wild animals, intended for exhibition. Art educational stops. Beeswax. Books and pamphlets in foreign languages. Books and music for the blind. Alizarine. Crude opium. Sour orange juice. Caustic potash and carbonate, chlorate, sulphate and crude nitrate of potash. Dandelion root. Chlorate of soda. Unground chicory root. Common blue clay. Engraver's diamonds. Watch jewels. Cartridges. Dates. Uncleaned human hair. Hat materials of straw and other vegetable fiber. India rubber scraps. Hand-sewing and darning needles. Forged shotgun barrels. Matting for floors, of round or split straw. Nut oil. Olive oil for mechanical purposes. Nickel ore and nickel matte. Sulphur ore of sulphuret of iron containing over 25 per cent of sulphur. Quicksilver flasks, foreign, which have been exported. Bulbs and bulbous roots, not edible. Jute, jute butts, manilla, sisal grass, sunn and other grasses. Orchids, jilly of the valley and other hothouse plants. Molasses. Raw sugar. Tar and pitch of coal or wood. Tinsel wire, lame or lath. Tobacco stems. Spirits of turpentine. Briar root and briar wood cut into blocks.

Now compare these with the following list upon which the duties were increased, or placed for the first time, and then say what you think of this aim of the republican party to reduce the duty or put upon the free list all articles of real necessity or raw material:

Sulphuric acid, lime, granite, boiler iron, cotton ties, (because used exclusively in the south), tin, iron or steel bars, quicksilver, zinc, cotton thread and many kinds of cotton

wool, woolen and worsted yarns, woolen and worsted cloths, shawls and knit fabrics, blankets, hats of wool, flannels, women's and children's dress goods, greatly made clothing, cloaks, dolmans, jackets, taffetas, ulsters, webbing, goring, suspenders, braids, buttons, carpets, printing paper, etc.

Every man can see for himself how much the republicans have aimed to put real necessities on the free list by comparing the above lists.
