BINGHAM, BINGAMY.—This morning a warrant was issued out of Justice Humphrey's court for the arrest of Moses C. Bingham. Marshal Hoffman arrested Mr. Bingham in Lebanon, where he was working at his trade, and brought him to Albany. J. R. Wyatt appeared for the state and D. R. N. Blackburn for the defendant. Mr. Bingham waived examination and was held under \$500 bonds to await the action of the grand jury, which convenes next month.

A certified copy of the certificate of the county clerk of Alpena county, Mich., in the hands of the district attorney, shows that Moses C. Bingham and Elizabeth Smith were married, in Alpena, Mich., on Jan. 28, 1873, he being 35 years of age and the bride 28 years old. It is stated that no divorce has been secured. A marriage ceremony was performed between Mr. Bingham and Hannah A. Warren, in this city, on Feb. 25, 1890. It looks now as if nothing can keep the defendant from a year or more in the state penitentiary. Mrs. Bingham will leave Alpena in time to be here at the meeting of the grand jury. She has two children, the fruits of the marriage, a man and a girl under her care. The defendant was released on \$500 bail, his Albany wife and F. M. Redfield, acting as sureties.

DEVoured BY CRICKETS.—J. C. Luckey, Indian agent at Warm Springs was in town the first of the week, and reported that the crickets had destroyed nearly all the crops and gardens on the reservation, and had also eaten most of the grass on the range. They made their first appearance on the reservation about the middle of last week, coming from the northeast, and arrived at the agency Sunday morning. From the agency the crickets are traveling west into the Cascade mountains, where they will probably be frozen to death. The army of crickets is about eight or ten miles long and from two to three miles wide. Mr. Luckey said this raid made by the crickets will leave the Indians without provisions for the next year, and there will be considerable suffering among them if they have to rely on their own resources for provisions.—Oregon Review.

NO WONDER.—On Wednesday a family with a car load of stock, etc., from Northwestern Kansas, arrived in Silverton says the Appeal. From them we learn a little how people get along in the land of grasshoppers and cyclones. The outfit consisted of 5 horses, 4 cows and 2 calves, plows, hoes, wagons and household goods. The reason that all this stuff was brought to the state, is that not a thing could be sold in Kansas. The gentleman says last year he planted 90 acres of corn and when harvest came he had 25 bushels on the entire 90 acres for his trouble. He also sowed 30 acres of wheat and not a stalk made its appearance. Cattle would not bring anything. It was almost impossible to get money. He says if he had offered to work for 25 cents per day with his team he could not have got it. The wagons are covered with a sort of white mud and the whole outfit looks rather forlorn.
