If those who have received the paper will be kind enough to pay for the time it has been received, it will enable us to pay our board and, perhaps, settle with the very few that have overpaid. The Journal has been running behind about \$60 per month since starting, with nothing for the publisher. We could afford to work for nothing for a while if we could make enough out of the profits of the institution to pay our hands, but as it is not, if there is anything that parties need that is in our possession, will sell for cash or turn it over to pay debts.

A BURGLAR CAPTURED.

A Thieving Experience in the Detective Business.

For some time it had been suspected by Marshal Hoffman that a gang of thieves were camped in the thick woods east of the city along the Willamette. Yesterday Marshal Hoffman offered Charles Spaght \$10 if he would locate the camp for him. This young Spaght, who is familiar with all the country around Albany, having hunted a great deal, started out to do. He is a fearless youth and did his work well. Running on two men, he knew at once that he had the right ones. They were camped and lying in their blankets, taking things easy. Spaght claimed to be a pigeon hunter, and pointing to a white farm house in the distance, just seen through the trees, said that was his home, putting them off their guard. Returning to Albany last evening he notified Marshal Hoffman, who with Policeman A. W. McClain and C. O. Lee, and Young Spaght, all armed with guns, they returned towards the camp. One of the men they ran across a short distance from the camp, and covering him with their weapons of war he gave himself up, and said he would lead them towards the camp. Instead he endeavored to guide them away from it, quickly detected by young Spaght, who pointed to the right place, when McClain took the lead for him, finding the other man lying on the ground. He jumped up and started to run, when McClain shot at him. The man fell to the ground, and said he was down, evidently playing "possum," for it threw the officer off his guard. Then the fellow took advantage of the situation and sprang for the bushes, followed by a couple of shots. He made his escape through the thick bushes, and was not discovered, though he was seen passing a farm house afterwards. All he had on was a pair of pants and shirt. The officers returned to Albany with the man captured, and their outfit. Two watches were found in the man's possession, one with a chain and locket used as a charm, labeled "presented to U. Whitney by Samuel Lodge No. 23 A. F. & A. M." This was stolen from the safe of Whitney, Elder & Co., blown up at Stayton, and will undoubtedly convict the man. The man also had forty dollars in money on his person. The burglar outfit consists of all the appliances for getting into a safe, ten drills, fuses, dynamite, tubes, etc., besides three first-class revolvers. The officers have done a good job in even getting one of these professional burglars. They are probably the same men who robbed Nolan's store at Corvallis, but probably had nothing to do with the Beam burglary, as they are of a different class of burglars, being safe crackers.

THE OTHER MAN RUN OVER.

When the construction train this morning was coming south past a trestle near Marion, the remains of a man were discovered on the track, all cut to pieces. He only had a shirt and pair of pants on, and answered the description of the escaping burglar. He had undoubtedly been run over by the overland train, being caught on the trestle as it passed, meeting a horrible death. His "parl" in the jail says he often stated that he would never be taken a live, and was a genuine tough. Mr Thos Callahan, with J. M. Nolan, of Corvallis, was in the city, and thought one of the watches was one stolen from Mr Nolan's safe recently. It had been in it several years. An independence man, who came to the city, was confident two of the revolvers were stolen at that city from a safe blown open there. The man killed was identified by a letter from his brother, who is recorder of Yamhill county, as a young man named Harrison. The letter requested him on account of his bad character to leave the country, as he was a disgrace to the family. He also has a brother in Salem. He just about had time to get to the long wood pile, one mile this side of Marion, as the overland stopped for wood. In trying to get on the break beam as the train started, it is probable he fell under the wheels. The man at the county jail arrested refuses to give any information to identify the man killed with the one who escaped our officers; but they are probably the same.

Tuesday evening, May 26, 1891.

The committee on streets and public property recommended, in matter of petition of E. F. Sox and others, that the grade on 1st, 2nd and Salem roads remain as now established. Adopted.

A large number of street improvements were ordered made according to notice published in the Democrat, to be done within thirty days. The Recorder to advertise for bids for all or any part; the council to adjourn until Tuesday night next to open bids and for general business.

Mr French, of committee on fire and water reported electric being changed.

City Recorder reported that the specifications for bridge were on file.

Report of street commissioner recommended several improvements. Referred.

The committee on fire and water recommended that arrangements be made for horses for the two engines, the purchase of necessary harnesses, etc., the necessary expense being estimated at \$25.00 per month after once established, the estimated cost of harness, etc., is \$300. A contract was ordered made with A. B. Lacy and G. W. Barkhart for one year, to furnish and care for horses for the horses.

The time for receiving bids for Willamette bridge was ordered extended from June 12 to June 27, 2 to 4 p. m. Recorder to insert advertisements for bids at once. The successful bidder is to begin work within twenty days after contract and complete work before December 1st.

Mr Tabler stated that city engineer had informed him that three miles of lateral sewers to run into Railroad street sewer only half a mile had been built.

The Recorder was directed to advertise for bids for lateral sewer across Railroad street between 5th and 6th streets.

The matter of bidding for main sewers under the system prepared by Surveyor Barr was discussed and deferred until Tuesday evening, when a system will be adopted.

Licenses to sell liquor were granted to J. E. Munsey and Frederick Goulet.

A meeting of the board of equalization was ordered called for June 10, at 2 p. m.

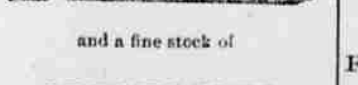
