

THE MAN RUN OVER.—It is now definitely learned that the man killed was the year-old son of Hon. Wyatt Harris, of Minville, recorder of Yamhill county. His name was Homer G. J. A. Rotan, the son of the late, who went up yesterday to the city to see the doctor. He was found in a coffin, and Fred L. Harris, brother, took charge of it and started out for McMinnville, passing through here at a little past 12 o'clock this morning. Homer had \$8 on his person when he was found. His people are heart-broken. The coroner's jury, empaneled by Homer Scott, found a verdict in accordance with the above facts. "Harris' head, and right arm were severed from the body, and the bowels and breast horribly lacerated."—Statesman.

Though a pair of shoes were found on the track near the body of Harris, his feet were not mutilated and it is probable they were not worn by him. He was about the age of the man who escaped from the Albany officers and apparently the same size, and it is probable was the same man. He had plenty of time to get to the place where he was killed.

A PECULIAR ACCIDENT.—On Tuesday this week a party of men corralled a stallion at Powell buttes, and when one of the party attempted to catch the animal by throwing a rope on him, he made a desperate break for liberty by jumping over the fence that surrounded the enclosure. The corral is made of logs and is nearly or quite eight feet high. Uncle Jim Vanderpool was on the topmost log in the panel and the horse tried to jump. This log knocked off the fence and Uncle Jim fell. In the fall he received a blow on the head that knocked him senseless for a time; but, fortunately, his hurt was not serious one, and he soon rallied. The horse fell over the fence on the outside, back down into a fire that was being used to heat branding irons, and was severely burned.—Prineville News.

MEETING SOME BREAKERS.—Mr. Terry, representing Lewis & Dryden, of Portland, who is in the city delivering "Albany Illustrated," is meeting with some knotty problems, caused by the tricks of B. F. Conrad, who got up the work. Conrad went out to Lewis & Dryden. One of the contracts presented in Albany was signed by E. Young for \$75 worth of pamphlets. Mr. Young states that it is a forgery. DECORATION DAY PROGRAM.

First.—Invitations are extended to each church, secret order, school, college, academy, militia company, and all officers, sailors and marines and the public generally.

Second.—It is the request that the national colors be placed on the court house, school buildings and the college buildings in the city and county on Memorial Day.

Third.—Members of McPherson Post, as well as members of all other posts, will appear in uniform, if possible, and the ladies of McPherson Women's Relief Corps will appear at the post hall as early as 8 o'clock, and earlier if possible, to prepare flowers and memorial badges. The officers and members of Company F, O. N. G., teachers, professors, school children, students, members of different secret societies, and the public generally, will assemble on Ferry street, near the G. A. R. hall and will be ready to form the procession at 8 o'clock a. m. sharp.

Fourth.—The procession will form on Ferry street, with the head of the column to the south and in the following order:

- 1.—Band.
- 2.—Officers of Second regiment, and Co. F, O. N. G., and officers thereof.
- 3.—Members of McPherson Post, all old soldiers, sailors and marines.
- 4.—Ladies of W. R. C.
- 5.—Sons of veterans.
- 6.—Professors and students of colleges and academies, teachers and pupils of public schools.
- 7.—Members of different churches and secret societies.
- 8.—The public generally.

Fifth.—The procession will move precisely at 8 o'clock south on Ferry street to Seventh street to the gate on the south side of the city cemetery; and proceeding directly from the gate to the graves to be decorated.

Sixth.—On reaching the cemetery the procession will form around the graves as follows: The column will march around the graves as follows: The column will march around the graves, half right face, forming a hollow square. Company F, O. N. G., forming the south side facing the north; members of McPherson Post W. R. C., Sons of Veterans, old soldiers, sailors and marines the east side, facing the west; professors and students of colleges and academies, teachers and pupils to the north facing the south; with smaller children with flowers and evergreens in front, and the members of different church societies and organizations, secret orders and the public generally the west side of the square facing the east.

Seventh.—Memorial address by Judge D. R. N. Blackburn, depositing flowers and evergreens on the graves, firing salutes in the order prescribed by the ritual.

Eighth.—Services by the W. R. C. at the unknown graves.

Reforming the procession and return to the G. A. R. hall.

Notice is hereby given that the Common Council of the city of Albany, Oregon, will receive sealed bids for the building of a bridge across the Willamette river from the north line of First street at the junction of said First street with Calapooia street, to the north side of said river, in accordance with the plans, specifications and survey now on file in the office of the Recorder of the city of Albany; said bridge to be 1329 feet in length, and 29 feet wide in the clear and composed of six (6) spans; the approach to be respectively 30 feet and 345 feet in length and 20 feet wide; such bid may also be accompanied with plans and specifications of the bidder, which will be considered by the council. Bids will be received for an all steel bridge, and must be accompanied by drawing showing plans and elevations of both substructure and superstructure; diagram of stresses for spans of different lengths, and full specification of the material and workmanship of the details of such bridge. Bids must be filed with the Recorder of said city on or before the hour of 1 o'clock p. m. of the 27th day of June, 1891, and must be accompanied by certified check for five per cent of the amount of the bid. The contractor to whom the contract may be awarded will be required to enter into a written agreement and contract, and to give bond to the city of Albany in double the amount of the contract price for the construction of such bridge, and for the faithful and strict performance of the contract in all its terms, conditions and details. Work must be commenced within 30 days from execution of contract, and be completed to the perfect satisfaction of the engineer in charge of the work and construction of said bridge and of the City Council, on or before the 1st day of December, 1891.
