MISREPRESENTING THE SUGAR.—"Will the omniscient brother who penned the wheat item in the DEMOCRAT, be kind enough to tell his readers that "the commercial editor of the Harrisburg Courier" was correct when he stated that May & Senders sold 3000 bushels of wheat at \$1 a bushel, and that the one dollar, which is, by the way, a few cents more than has been given by any one in Albany this season, was the price paid to them here."—Harrisburg Courier.

The following from a Harrisburg correspondent, absolutely reliable, will show that the DEMOCRAT knew what it was talking about: "The amount paid for the wheat of May & Senders was one dollar a bushel, and I. O. B. the boat, was bought by Fischer, of Corvallis, who said it was not really worth it, but he would pay it rather than cut off any of his established trade. We would call that price 92c net, not more. No merchant has paid a dollar a bushel for wheat here. I write you this because I don't believe in a town getting out misrepresentations just to appear 'big.' Odds and ends of wheat are coming in here at 90c."—L. S. TAYLOR.

RICH SHOWING.—News from the mines is very encouraging and many are fitting out to go from Brownsville. The following is just received in this city as the result of five milling tests made in Tacoma from the Tacoma company's mines in the Calipoola and Blue river districts: First \$8.21, second \$6.22, third \$3.26, fourth \$8.21, fifth \$8.21 per ton in gold and silver, principally gold. This company is running a tunnel in Treasure hill, on its ledge, and the last ore came from the face of the tunnel 160 feet from the mouth, so it shows conclusively that the ore improves fast as depth is attained.
