The result of the consolidation election at Portland yesterday was as follows: Portland for consolidation 7165, against 954. East Portland for consolidation 1823, against 298. Albina for consolidation 1138 and 462 against. Total vote 11840.

A dispatch from Akron, Ohio, says:

Incorporated papers filed at Columbus today for the Consolidated Oatmeal company with a capital stock of \$5,500,000. All the oatmeal mills of the country are brought under one management.

The McKinley bill increased the duty on oatmeal just 100 per cent. This was done to promote trusts as shown above.

The prohibitive effect of the higher tariff taxes of the McKinley bill as shown by the fact that the receipts from customs at the port of New York for the first twenty days of May, 1891, are \$1,690,634 less than for the corresponding period of 1890. After raising the taxes to decrease the surplus, while at the same time increasing expenses, the republicans have not found the fire more comfortable than the frying-pan.

The Salt Lake Herald, for twenty-one years the organ of the people's party of Utah, and the foremost Mormon journal, has passed into the hands of Gentile democrats, who are pushing the movement in Utah to organize the parties on national lines. R. C. Chambers, superintendent of the Ontario mine, and Frank H. Dyer, ex-United States marshal, are at the head of the Gentiles' names in Utah. The price paid for the newspaper was \$100,000. Chambers is president of the new company. A minority of the stock is held by Mormons, who have abandoned the people's party and enrolled themselves in the democratic movement.

THE KNAVES AND THEIR DUPES.

Protection to home industries is a taking card and a good motto if it could be lived up to; but self-interest, while it is the loudest to yell for it, is the first to take advantage of the loopholes to profit at the expense of those it is able to dupe, along with those who are unable to save themselves from paying tribute to the injustices laid upon them by ignorance. The following advertisement, from the Welsh Herald, a paper published in the northern part of Wales, explains the point we desire to make:

WANTED—150 slate makers; steady employment will be given and good wages will be paid to sober men, industrious and ingenious in slate quarries. For further particulars inquire at the office of this paper or address the Vermont Slate Company, Granville, New York, America.

This is only one of many similar advertisements which appear in foreign papers. The undertaking of the Vermont trust is in gross violation of the contract labor law. It is outrageous to reflect how American labor is swindled and deluded by the knaves of protection. Happily, the workmen are beginning to understand how farcical is the pretense that the robber tariff is levied for their benefit. The man who is fooled is as much to blame as the knave, for the latter banks on the former's stupidity. It is the old trick of the three card monte men in another garb.

MUCH CRY, LITTLE WOOL.

In Philadelphia the owners of woolen mills have organized a club committed to a defense of the McKinley bill.

This bill protects these mill owners from foreign competition. This protection enables them to lower the grade of their products and at the same time to advance their prices.

The Dry Goods Economist has had an expert examine some of the "all wool" goods made by these same Philadelphia protectionists. Here is the result:

"This firm has sold in large quantities this season a worsted fabric weighing twenty-two to twenty-three ounces, varying in price from a piece dyed solid black at \$1.50 to fancy weavers from \$1.62½ to these containing silk twist at \$1.75. The fabric is composed of a worsted warp made from delaine wool, which entirely composes the face of the cloth and constitutes 28 per cent of its weight. The filling makes the balance of 72 per cent, and is entirely cotton and shoddy, in the proportion of 92½ per cent cotton and 7½ per cent shoddy.

"We have also before us a finer fabric of the same order in a fancy trousering selling at \$2.42½, to all appearances a solid worsted fabric, both face and back. An examination, however, proves these appearances are deceptive. The fabric is of a class known as a filling cord stripe, having a slight mixture of silk twist between the cords. The worsted is of three-eighths and delaine stock, yet every alternate pick of filling is cotton, as is also the warp between the filling cord and the back warp. Thus we have a cloth which every one but an expert would call an all wool worsted cloth, yet contains 21 per cent of cotton and 79 per cent of worsted."

No wonder these men want protection, but they are no more entitled to it than are the makers of counterfeit money.

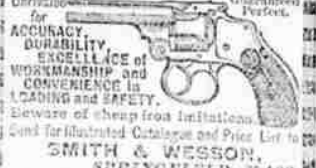
