A MIDNIGHT FIRE.—About 15 minutes after 12 o'clock this morning, the fire bell rang out as if for business. The old brick factory on Lyon street, between Third and Fourth, was on fire. When the engines reached the place the building was a mass of flames. Water was started in racing time, the department doing as prompt and quick work as was probably ever done here in case of a midnight fire. The flames were extinguished, leaving the frame work of the old structure standing. The building contained some furniture belonging to C. J. Dillon, left over when he closed his business here, only part of which was consumed, three heavy streams keeping the flames well in the rear and in the second story. The furniture was moved into the building about three weeks ago, and was insured in the Connecticut Insurance Co., W. E. McPherson, agent, on May 27th, for \$1475, on furniture stock, and \$25 on furniture tools. The building was owned by Dr. M. H. Ellis and was not insured. It was an old structure, and was not worth very much, perhaps \$200. The fire was undoubtedly incendiary. A man, who passed the building at 10:30 o'clock, heard a suspicious noise inside the building, but thought nothing of it. Night watchman Jones passed the building from his midnight lunch about 12 o'clock, but noticed nothing out of the way.

A CIRCUS COMING.—We are advised by the Sells Brothers that their enormous united shows will positively visit Albany, on Wednesday, August 19, all the advance arrangements for that purpose having been completed. Among the rare features it exhibits will be found a pair of giant hippopotami, pair of Lilliputian cattle, flock of ostriches, and hairless horse. A most fascinating novelty is the long skirt dancing of Cyrene, emotional Spanish artists.

THE BIDS FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF THE DORMITORY AT THE AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE were opened today and while the conclusions were not made public, we learn the bids were as follows: Schell & Conn, Albany, \$24,172; Craven, Salem, \$20,600; Southworth, \$21,712; A. F. Peterson, \$22,233; Butler, \$23,236; Heckert, \$25,775; Blair, \$27,185; Hoffman, \$25,969; McFadden, \$26,250. It was estimated that \$15,000 would build the dormitory, and whether they will accept the lowest bid or modify the plans has not been decided on.—Corvallis Times.

The following bills were ordered paid: J. N. Hoffman, \$31.50; Albany & Astoria R. R., \$1.50; Geo. Stinson, \$5; E. Lamb, \$3.50; W. B. Barr, \$64; Geo. Burkhardt, \$2; C. Dickey, \$1; Robert Shahan, \$3; Standard & Cusick, \$1; S. W. Reese, \$3; Matthews & Washburn, \$10.90; Mason & Strang, \$49.50; Electric Light Co., \$182. Reports on each of 39 lateral sewers was made by Surveyor Barr and filed.

Petition of John H. Wallace and ors that owners of property adjoining Main street be allowed to use pit instead of river gravel in grading the street. Referred with power to act and accept pit gravel in all cases where thought best.

The Mayor was directed to appoint a committee to confer with a committee from the Albany Farmers Co. in reference to the north end of Jackson street. Committee, Councilmen Burkhardt, Tabler and Garrett.

The Street Commissioner reported great complaint on account of cows being tied to fences and sidewalks. The Recorder was directed to notify the poundmaster to enforce the ordinance.

Matter of offensive water closets at corner of Broadalbin and Seventh streets and on Geo. S. Coe's property near corner of First and Lyon streets, was referred to committee on streets and public property. Adjourned until Saturday evening.
