CRACK COUNTY.—On Monday of last week a boy named Stone, 15 years of age, a brother of H B Stone, was dragged to death by a horse at Sumner lake.

F O Sexton, of Dufur, who took some horses to the valley to sell, has returned and says there are ten horses to one buyer, and horses are cheaper in the valley than they are here.

Every sheep raiser in the county had had as good success lambing this spring as did John Circle, the number of sheep owned have been more than doubled. He had 926 ewes and raised 634 lambs.

Mr. and Mrs. S A D Porter, who were traveling from the south towards Prineville, were caught in the recent storm at Sutton Springs, where Mrs Porter gave birth to a child. There being no medical aid in reach the child died, and Mrs. Porter, who has been removed to Silver Lake, is in a precarious condition.

John Circle came down from Beaver Thursday. He says the weather clerk changed the order of things somewhat on the head of Beaver last Monday. In stead of a water spout they had a snow spout. A cloud burst occurred there on that date and nearly a foot of snow fell inside of half an hour. Mr. Circle says the snow fell in almost a solid body, and while it was falling so completely filled the air that one could not distinguish objects fifty feet away.—Ochoco Review.

FIGHT WITH AN ANTELOPE.—This week as W H Frazier and J C Abbott were coming in from their ranches in the eastern part of the county, they saw a band of antelope near Juniper Buttes, and Mr Frazier fired on them, having only one cartridge in his gun. He broke once leg, and the animal allowed him to approach within a few feet of it when it turned on him and made fight. It got one horn fastened in Mr Frazier's clothes and was proving too wiry an opponent for him, when Mr Abbott and a boy who was with them came to his relief and ended the animal's life. The antelope was worrying Mr Frazier considerably, and he thinks that it would have got the better of him had the battle continued single handed. As it was, the battle only cost him a pair of pants which the antelope entirely demolished.—Ochoco Review.
