THE OREGON PIONEERS.

PORTLAND, JUNE 17, 1891.

**Editors Democrat:** Following the exciting municipal election on Monday, the 15th, the meeting of the Pioneers on the following day was an event that will be long remembered. It was by far the best pioneer gathering in numbers, in spirit and pleasures that Portland ever had. The day happened to be pleasant and warm; night, however, brought the famous Oregon mist.

The procession was formed at the Hotel Portland, ladies in carriages, and proceeded to the Exposition building, where the usual exercises were held.

It was a noble sight to look upon that procession. A finer, nobler and more determined looking body of men and women could not be found anywhere. There was a gentle manner and grace about these old mothers that made them objects of love and veneration. The pioneer men would be marked men the world over. These pioneers are a body of whom Oregon should be proud. Some of the incidents of the occasion were quite significant.

Mrs Hobson, step mother of Hon John Hobson, of Astoria, aged 86 years, was seated on the right of the president, in a willow chair, the back of which was profusely covered and interwoven with the most beautiful white roses. The aged body thus honored had a tender and sweet expression of countenance, and attracted the special, but interesting attention and applause of all present. On the left there was another chair, similarly decorated with red roses. We will call them for the sake of the occasion, the "Mission Rose," for they are the sweetest rose we have. In this chair sat that venerable looking pioneer, Rev I H Parrish, aged 87 years, who, since 1842, has devoted his entire life to the promotion of religious work in Oregon. These two distinguished pioneers faced the audience, comprising the great body of pioneers and citizens present.

The meeting was opened with music and prayer. Speeches followed and they were all good. That of Mr Lydell Baker, grandson of Col Baker, senator from Oregon, who, in the Union service, was killed at Ball's Bluff, Virginia, was excellent, and delivered without notes in a very eloquent and impressive manner. After the afternoon exercises a recess was taken until 7 o'clock, when the banquet was open to all.

Some of the first ladies of Portland not only prepared the banquet, but waited on the tables during the entire three hours of "supper." The tables were loaded down with every luxury the season and market afforded. It was estimated that over one thousand ate at these tables, and there was enough left to "feed" as many more. These ladies of Portland deserve the greater credit for this banquet, for they struck the very key note, that which will give greater interest to these occasions by adding the banquet rather than dancing; when the fact is the young people will, as usual, do all the dancing to the exclusion of the pioneers. It was a grand success.

During the evening four of the survivors of the Whitman massacre—three women and one man, then children—were presented to the audience in the presence of one of those who rescued them, Mr Edward Chamberlain. This was a touching scene. The survivors are Mr J F Young, Washington county; Mrs Chapman, nee Bewley, of Sheridan; Mrs Rebecca Cone, nee Hall, Portland; Mrs N A Jacobs, nee Osborne, Portland, Oregon.

**Mr W S Ladd, the noted banker,** was chosen president for the coming year.

An effort was made to extend the limit of membership to the date of admission of the state, but failed.

The proposition to join the Astoria people in May, 1892, in celebrating the one hundredth anniversary of the entrance into and naming of the river Columbia, by Capt Gray, was left to the officers of the association.

There are many reasons that can be given why even this celebration should be given in Portland rather than Astoria. But the better thing to do, and it is to be regretted that it was not suggested at this meeting, is to accept the invitation of the Washington pioneers, and celebrate this centennial anniversary at Vancouver, in May, 1892. The pioneers of the two states could meet there and have a glorious celebration, with comforts of every name. Washington could bring her claims to Vancouver and have a repeat that could not be excelled. Why not make it the occasion of the meeting of the pioneers of the two states. Have it at this point so accessible to the people of "old Oregon," and upon the banks of the stream bearing the historic name to be honored on this occasion. Give us this celebration above all. Our newspapers should take the matter up and see that this program is carried out. Meet at Vancouver in May, 1892, invite Idaho and have a jolly, good time. Astoria is, for this celebration, just far enough out of the way to prevent a large and general attendance. It should be made broad and to cover the entire territory of "old Oregon." \* \* \*
