BUILDING & LOAN ASSOCIATION.—At the regular monthly meeting, last evening, \$500 was loaned to McPherson Post G A R 10.00 months interest in advance, and \$400 to G W Dodder at 62 months interest in advance. CORNER STONE LAID.

The corner stone of the United Presbyterian Church was laid this morning with a short and interesting program. The stones were placed in position under charge of the contractor, Mr H C Chamberlain. They are of granite, one facing north on 5th street, face 26x18 inches, having a sunken panel with the letters in relief, "United Presbyterian Church." The other facing east on Washington street, of same size, bearing the figures in relief 1891. The sealed box enclosed in the stone contained the following:

1. A history of the congregation, which was organized Oct 16, 1853, with twelve charter members, of whom but three are members at present, viz, Mrs Rebecca Young, Mrs Welby Miller and Mr Andrew Ralston.
2. The original call made out for the present pastor on the 13 of June, 1857, of the 15 names attached to the call: 7 are still in the church, viz, Mrs Young, Mrs Miller, Mr Ralston, Mr Jno Smith, Mr Tate, Mrs Monteth and Mrs Bodine.
3. The present roll of church members, containing 120 names, of whom 13 are marked absent.

4. The roll of the Sabbath School containing the names of all scholars, officers and teachers.

5. The roll of the two societies of Christian Endeavor, Junior and regular.

6. The succession of officers in the church and names of the building committee as follows: Edward F Sox, President; L E Blain, Treasurer; Jay W Blain, Secretary. S E Young, Mrs S E Young, Mrs L E Blain, Mrs Henrietta Brown, & M Robertson and Dr G W Gray.

7. Several papers, United Presbyterian, and copies of the Democrat and Herald.

8. Photographs of Rev James P Miller, who organized the congregation of the present pastor, and of the senior member, John Smith, now 90 years of age, who accompanies his photograph with a written expression of his faith in God.

9. Some pamphlets of local interest concerning Albany, and her churches, schools and a copy of the testimony of the U P church and a specially engraved card from the sexton, Mr John Morrison.

A short address was made by the pastor on christians as "living stones," 1 Pet. 2. 5. They are to be beautified by polish of Divine Grace. They are more permanent than granite. They all will be built up in the ONE HOUSE OF GOD. Verses were sung from Ps. 118.

"That stone is made head cornerstone, which builders did despise. This is the doing of the Lord, And wondrous to our eyes."

Rev McCleod of the Congregational church offered prayer, and the assembly was dismissed with the benediction.
