WHAT IS BACCARAT.—In view of the Prince of Wales having been a banker in a game of baccarat some people would like to know what it is:

Baccarat is played with three packs of cards, a banker, and any number of players up to twelve. The banker shuffles the three packs and then deals two cards to the right, two to the left and two to himself. Half the players sit at his right and half at his left. Should the sum of any two cards dealt equal nine the holder declares his point and wins. Should either the player to the right or the left hold a 10 spot or a face card it is counted as zero. So, too, when the sum of any two cards is more than 10 the cipher is dropped. Thus a seven and a nine, making 16, would count as a six; two sevens as four, two nines as eight, and so on. If the sum of the first two cards dealt is less than five the player must call for another card, which is dealt to him face up. The object is to make nine points. Whichever comes nearest to that number, either player or banker, wins. The banker may win from or lose to both sides at once, or may win from one and lose to the other. The percentage to the banker is large.

BITE LIKE FISH.—All a stranger has to do is to stand in the street and deliver a flowery harangue to sell all the cheap John articles he can pack in a valise. The rapidity with which they fly is astonishing. Sometimes, though, the purchaser gets considerable substance, the fact is though, never without paying an enormous percentage on the value of the article, for they are universally of a cheap order, made to sell on "snaps."
