HITS OREGON.

There is no place like Oregon, to most of us. It is a wealthy state, considering its population. Not only has it never failing wheat fields, but for fruit and other products its soil is well adapted.

Its mineral wealth is considerable. Its timber is unsurpassed, both for building and wood. In its cities are growing up gradually, manufacturing interests of considerable importance. In Portland alone, last year, the output was \$12,000,000 to \$15,000,000. The average yield of wheat, according to the report of B S Pague, for 1890, was over 25 bushels to the acre. Our climate is the best. In the winter it rains some; in the summer it does not. The total rainfall is about 45 inches. It does not rain constantly in the winter, nor begin to. The winter goes to the depot at noon on a bicycle, and during the past winter only missed two or three times on account of rain, and only went in a light rain perhaps half a dozen times. We have no cyclones, and the health of our citizens is as good as that of people anywhere.

Below we publish parts of a letter published in the Gazette, of Lexington, Neb, not having space for the whole letter. The misstatements are barefaced ones, and will be interesting reading:

ALBANY, Or, May 28th, 1891.

EDITOR GAZETTE.—I consider it my duty to use my pen and influence to stop the people of Nebraska from coming to this country. There is not the slightest inducement for the mechanic, artisan, merchant or farmer to come to Oregon. The Willamette valley has a small portion of good tillable land, but the majority of it is rock, stone and gravel. A great portion of it is covered with a worthless fire timber that will scarcely make good fire wood.

This valley is overdone with large towns only a few miles apart. These towns have nothing to support them but a few scattering farmers. The building beams have collapsed and everyone of them are dead. I have seen more farmers in Lexington in one week than I see in Albany in one month. The credit system prevails here to a greater extent than in the east. These towns are all overloaded with stores and nothing to support them.

Portland is a city of about 50,000, has no farming country around it, and has nothing to support it but the railroads and emigration.

There is no building going on this season.

There is nothing to produce money in this country but wheat raising. The farmers do not realize much from fruit. The markets are so overloaded and the price so low that many farmers do not gather their fruit at all but let their hogs eat it.

The price of wheat in Oregon is about the same as in Nebraska, from 50 to 60 cents per bushel.

The season for plowing and planting is in the winter when it is raining constantly. Many eastern people who have come here lately, and are not accustomed to the climate, have ruined their health working in the rain.

Crops are nearly as uncertain here as in Nebraska.

If Nebraska only has a good crop once in four years it will produce more than Oregon will raise in ten years, for nine-tenths of Oregon will not raise anything. There has never been found a paying mine in Oregon. Most of the timber is unfit for lumber, and is of little use as fire wood. I have been in twelve states and Oregon is the poorest country I ever saw.

Most of the Kansas and Nebraska people here are disgusted with the country and would go back if they could. As for myself I shall never spend another rainy season in Oregon. I think I shall sell off my stock and return to Nebraska; it is the best country I know of, and is worth 40 such states as Oregon. Mountains, timber and gravel do not bring trade to the merchant or support the laboring man.

I have studied this country for five months and there is no truth in anything that has been advertised or claimed for it. It is not a good farming, fruit growing or mineral country.

If there is anyone in Lexington who has got the Oregon fever, they had better write to me, and I think their fever will cool down and they will keep their money and stay where they are.
