THE BOYS IN BLUE.—This noon F. Co. for Eugene about thirty strong. A detachment of four or five had already preceded them. They were in charge of Capt. Chamberlain, and Capt. ASSESSMENTS.—Notwithstanding the fact there is generally a system in most cities of assessing property at a certain proportion of its actual value. In Marion county, for instance, this year they are assessing horses at 75 per cent of their actual value. Cattle are assessed at \$15 to \$20 per head for those over 3 years old, 2-year-olds \$8, yearlings \$5; sheep, \$1.50 per head, etc. In Linn county about the same system prevails. In different counties, though, there is a wide swath cut. The rate in Linn county is as high as in any county in Oregon, and is higher in most cases in Albany than in the county.

A MINING EXPERT HERE.—Mr. Leigh Harnett, the well known mining expert and Oregonian correspondent is in the city. Mr. Harnett is probably the best posted man in the northwest on our mining resources. He has done the Santiam and Calapooya mines and pronounced them marvels of wealth in gold and silver and wonders why people do not get more excited. Our mining prospects are wonderful, and it is only a question of a short time when this will be the center of a great mining attraction.

A MILL CITY ACCIDENT.—Hugh Wilson who has been working for the mill company on the mountain south of here, cutting timber, had the misfortune to cut his foot nearly off on Wednesday afternoon at 1:20 o'clock. The ax struck about one inch from the base of the small toe and run to the upper portion of the instep on the left foot. The three middle toes are entirely cut through and it will be a very close call for Mr. Wilson if he saves his foot. —Gazette.

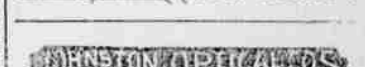
