WEATHER REPORT.

OREGON WEATHER BUREAU. CENTRAL OFFICE, PORTLAND, OREGON. CROP-WEATHER BULLETIN No. 16, FOR THE WEEK ENDING SATURDAY, JUNE 27, 1891.

In western Oregon the weather has continued cool, and general showers have prevailed, especially in the forepart of the week. While the rainfall the present month has been unusually heavy, yet in June, 1888, more rain fell at most stations. About one inch of rain fell in the Willamette valley, and about one half an inch fell in southern Oregon.

The fall wheat has had wonderful growth and is reported very high; wheat seven feet high is reported from Yamhill county. There has been no rust so far though in places it is very heavy and has lodged somewhat. Spring wheat has a good stand and will yield remarkably well. Warmth and sunshine are needed to ripen the wheat and to prevent rust and further lodging. Clover hay has been damaged to some extent. Hay is already cut, but the wet weather has greatly retarded it. Hop growers hope that the wet weather will help to kill the hop lice. The cool nights have prevented the flights of the codlin moth and they are less apparent than usual. Corn is doing well, but like all vegetation needs more sunshine and warmer weather. Western Oregon prospects were never better at this season of the year, than at present for bountiful harvest.

In eastern Oregon the rains have been most beneficial to the growing wheat and other cereals, corn, fruit and garden products; also to the hay and stock.
