

A CONGREGATIONAL COLLEGE.—Mr. Albert Brownell has returned from Portland where he has been attending a meeting of the committee for the establishment of a Congregational college in Oregon. Ten members of the committee were present. It was voted to establish a college according to the instructions of the association, and if Allen Shorey, James Steele and W. H. Morrow were appointed a committee to receive propositions. Mr. Brownell tells the Democrat that it is proposed to establish a high grade college, not a preparatory school, and that when a student graduates he will be up with the graduates of the best western college, and thinks Albany would have a good chance, on account of its superior location, and it is probable a proposition of land and money will be made from this city.

A BUSINESS GIRL.—Perhaps no child in the country can show a more sheepish countenance than Hattie, daughter of Cass Gibson, south of Rickreall, says the Dallas Herald. Four years ago her uncle, T. P. CIRCUIT COURT PROCEEDINGS.

The case of the State of Oregon against Elias Maxwell, arrested for incest, attracted the most attention of any case of the term, probably because of its unsavory nature, being just the kind of a case that does not enture to the moral advantage of society, whatever its termination. The case was prosecuted by the District Attorney, Hon. J. K. Weatherford and defended by Judge Whitney, D. R. N. Blackburn and Hon. W. R. Blyen. It was presented to the jury this forenoon, after elaborate addresses to the jury, and a sententious charge to the jury by Judge Boise that practically settled it. After being out fifteen minutes the jury brought in a verdict of "not guilty."
