THAT UNCONSTITUTIONAL LAW.—In speaking of the case at Lebanon in which the justice declared the law in reference to carrying concealed weapons unconstitutional the Express says: "The law reporter for the DEMOCRAT is in error. The grounds for dismissing the case against Gordon were, that the state had failed to establish the fact that the defendant had a weapon concealed about his person, though the evidence showed that defendant had a weapon in his hand. It was claimed by the defense that to secure a conviction it must be proven, as alleged, that the defendant had a concealed weapon." All the same, though, the entry was made as stated by the Express, on request of the attorneys. We are informed positively that the Justice did declare the law unconstitutional on the grounds stated.

A LINN COUNTY MAN AFTER IT.—Hon C B Moore is mentioned as successor to Hon Napoleon Davis, as clerk of the board of land commissioners, and also a gentleman from Linn county.—Journal. The remains were found in the woods by some hunters last Sunday, partly eaten by wild animals. In his pockets were half a dozen means of identification. In Memory of Past Chancellor James F. Hall, of Laurel Lodge, K. of P., No. 7.

"Death never separates; the golden wires That ever tremble to the names before, Will vibrate still, though every form expires, And those we love we look upon no more."

Again has the roll been called and our beloved brother has answered "Here!" and his is placed with the names that are written in the "Book of Gold" kept by Him, "Who doeth all things well."

Thus death has claimed him for his own before he had attained even the meridian of life, but merey stands beside and when one we love is taken hence, she plants upon the vacant spot the bloom of consolation, and of hope, whose fragrance soothes the sorrowing soul, and tells us "we shall meet again."

Brother Hall was born in Missouri and died in Albany, Oregon, June 26th, 1891, aged 29 years and five months. He was knighted in Laurel Lodge March 15, 1883, and gained the rank of Past Chancellor by service December 31, 1885. He represented his lodge in the Grand lodge in the sessions of 1887-8, and was D. D. G. C. for District No. 5 at the time of his death. He was also Captain of Columbia Division No. 4, Uniform Rank, K. of P., which position he had held since its organization, two years since. All offices and positions of trust confided to him received his careful and intelligent efforts, and were filled with honor to himself and benefit to the order of which he was ever proud. Therefore, be it

Resolved, That in the death of James F. Hall, a valiant Pythian knight has been taken from our midst, and to us is left to mourn the irreparable loss.

Resolved, That we extend our sympathy and condolence to the relatives of our deceased brother, and especially to his mourning sister, and assure her that "other hearts share the burdens of her grieving, when a loved one lies under the pall."

Resolved, That Pythian knight hood has suffered a sad bereavement, an incalculable loss, in the early demise of so vigorous and intelligent an advocate and member of our order.
