Ordinance Bill No 224, providing for issuing bonds to the amount of \$75,000 to the highest bidder, 40 per cent for sewerage, 60 per cent for Willamette bridge at northern terminus of Calapooia street, was read twice and referred.

Ordinance Bill 225, providing for the making of a contract with the Portland Bridge and Building Company for the construction of a bridge at Albany across the Willamette River, was read twice and referred.

Several resolutions of assessment were read of costs levied on different pieces of property in Albany, and liens were ordered made in lien docket to the amount of the respective bills for work done.

The nuisance on lot at corner of Broadalbin and Seventh streets caused by lack of connection with sewerage, and closet on O P property at corner of First and Lyon streets, were ordered abated.

A B Matthews, Thos Hopkins and Julius Gradwohl were appointed to examine sewer work just completed.

Contracts for building sidewalks were let to C E Wolverton for walk in front of his property at \$20, and other walks to J B Tillotson at 10 cents per foot and upwards, bonds to be given for double the amounts, work to be done in 20 days.
