LOCAL RECORD.

W. W. FIREMEN'S TOURNAMENT.—W. W. Watson, Secretary of the N. W. Firemen's Association, returned last evening from Portland, where the directors of the association had been in convention.

From him we get the following details in reference to the tournament, the 10th annual one. It will be held on Sept. 27, 28 and 29, at Victoria. During the week a State fair will be in session there. The fare will be \$14 and return from Albany, per capita less. The tournament will be a woman's affair, no professionals being allowed in any team. Strict rules will be followed to prohibit it. A sworn membership of 60 days will be required. A large number of teams ever entered was ten. This year fifteen have entered the association of their intention to compete at Victoria. The local teams will enter and will place all their apparatus at the disposal of their visitors. In prizes and four trophies, valued \$100, will be presented contestants. Following will be the contests, usual dress and running regulations: 100 yard dash—Prizes \$500, \$300 and \$100. 200 yard dash—Prizes \$500, \$300, \$100, gold medal, to be worn one year and need to association. If won three consecutive years, to be retained. 400 yard dash—Prizes, \$300, \$200 and \$100. 800 yard dash—Prizes, \$100, \$50 and silver medal. 1000 yard dash—Prizes, \$35, \$20 and silver plated coupling. 1000 yard relay, wet test, for teams not doing any first prize—Prizes, \$300, \$200 and \$100.

MINING MATTERS.—C. G. Burkhardt and W. Pipe, of the Albany Mining & Milling Co., arrived in San Francisco yesterday for the purpose of buying a stamp mill for the company. The mill will be shipped at once and it is expected to be running within a month. Mr. Burkhardt and Pipe will be home Saturday morning. Mr. Hasleton, the superintendent, and H. H. 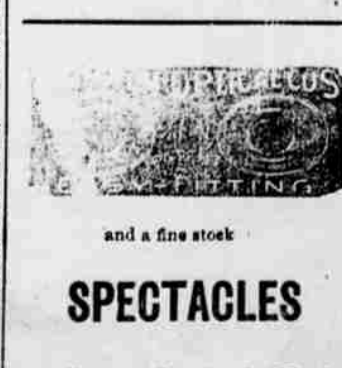
