

The political tide in Iowa has set in early and strongly for the democratic party. Recruits from the republican party were never as numerous and they include many prominent men. One of them is Captain Langstaff of Dubuque, one of the prominent republicans who in this year actively working for Governor Boies and against prohibition. He was chairman of the committee on arrangements for the last Grand Army encampment, which was held in Dubuque, and is prominent in Grand Army circles. The statement that M C Woodruff, who was editor of the Dubuque Times when that paper was a power in republican Iowa, will this year support Governor Boies, is confirmed by that gentleman himself, who in an interview spoke as follows:

"Well, I can say that I have heard prominent republicans say, in effect, that they had become thoroughly disgusted with the party. There is a feeling that the leaders have been juggling too much with important public questions and that they have done this to such an extent that the people have lost confidence and do not longer propose to be hoodwinked by them. The party has become a party of great promises and small achievements. The republicans with whom I have conversed since the Cedar Rapids convention all said unequivocally that they could not support the ticket. They did not say this because they are in love with the democratic party but because they are tired of the republican party of Iowa and they do not hesitate to say that the once great party has become a party of small men and big pretensions. Prohibition is the dead weight which has and will again drag the republicans of Iowa down to defeat, and they will have nobody to blame but themselves. They know it has been a failure, but still they persist in juggling with it and instead of taking a manly stand they permit themselves to be driven to ruin by the cranks of the party. One of the best republicans in Iowa, a man who has held the highest office in the gift of the people and who was a delegate to the Cedar Rapids convention, told me a day or two since that republican defeat was in the air, and I coincided with him and said there was no doubt about it. The ticket, he also said, was a very weak one, the weakest that could have been nominated, and it seems to me it was nominated in the full expectation that it would be defeated."

Major Richmond, a prominent republican and Grand Army man at Council Bluffs, in announcing his intention to support Horace Boies said: "I cannot understand how a body of intelligent men will meet in convention and adopt such a platform as that adopted by the republicans at Cedar Rapids, knowing, as they most certainly do, the sentiment of the people on this question. When prohibition is made a test of party fealty, they can count me out. I should not be surprised if Horace Boies has 25,000 majority this year. I am for him. I shall also support Judge Kinne, for Weaver is an extremist on prohibition. This is a good year for democrats."—Ex.

The superintendent of immigration has rendered a decision on the application of a stamping company of St. Louis, to be permitted to import skilled labor for their tinplate mills, to the effect that the immigration law plainly intends that skilled labor may be imported into the United States to do work in an industry not yet established, provided the skilled workmen in that industry cannot be found among our own people. Therefore, the importation will be permitted, as such cannot be found in the United States. If anything further were needed to show that McKinleyism means protection to the manufacturer and no protection to labor people, the above decision will supply the need. Pauper labor from Europe may be imported into the country to compete with our own labor people, but the product of pauper labor will not be permitted to be imported here to compete with our manufacturer. Such is the beauty of protectionism.

Chairman Watson, of the state central republican committee, of Nebraska, has announced that the republican party will probably have a candidate for the gubernatorial chair in the field this fall, although the supreme court decided that Thayer was a hold-over. Legal opinions are so varied on this point that it is decided best to be on the safe side. The alliance and democratic parties will have gubernatorial nominees on their tickets.

The Farmers' Alliance, of Marlboro county, South Carolina, has adopted resolutions to reduce the production of cotton by planting but ten acres to the horse, in 1892, provided all the cotton states co-operate, and asking the state alliance to call a convention of cotton growers to consider the scheme.
