LOCAL RECORD.

A LEG BROKEN.—F P Vaughn and L. H. Hutton are here with forty four head of horses, recently brought from Morrow county. On the way here they came near meeting with a fatal accident. After crossing the Jefferson bridge, their horses headed this way, the cars came along from Albany, and, for some reason known only to the engineer, he gave two or three short whistles, causing the horses to stampede and turn back for the bridge. Seeing them coming at full speed, and fearful that the weight would prove disastrous to the bridge, the men headed them off and they turned for the river. They were going with such speed that all plunged off into the water. They swam around for some time and then went out on the other side. The men took them through the levee and crossed the bridge with one half of them at a time. Mr. Vaughn was riding to head the excited horses, when his horse fell on his leg, breaking it just above the ankle. At first it was not thought to be broken, but afterwards the small bone in the back of the ankle was found to be broken. He was brought to Mrs. R. F. Ashby's, in this city, where he is now being cared for, and will, as soon as able, return to his family 12 miles from Eugene, Morrow county. There is talk of a suit against the R R company for damages.

THE MILL ORDERED.—C G Burkhardt and J V Pipe arrived home this morning from San Francisco, where they ordered the best stamp mill to be secured, in fact the best made, being an all steel mill with silver plated plates. It has all the latest appliances for saving the precious metal, and is a mill that is bound to do splendid work. The mill will weigh 70,000 pounds, and it will take three cars to haul it. Part of it will arrive in two weeks; but it will be a month before the entire mill is here, as some of it has to be ordered from Chicago. It will be running probably in two months, when it will pay from the start. The cost of the mill is about three times that of a common cast iron mill; but it is proposed to make it a permanent investment, and it will pay in the long run. The mill is an important one for Albany as well as the Sanilam mines. When once working and producing the big results it is bound to it will be the means of making the Sanilam the central mining attraction of the Pacific Coast, and it will not be many years before the Sanilam regions will be full of big mills.

A COOL AFFAIR.—Saturday a muscular young man of Albany concluded to whip another young man, whom we will call Heavy Set; but put it off until this forenoon, after a good Sunday's rest, when he called on him, and the two men faced each other in light apparel, in pugilistic style. Muscle made a pass at Heavy Set, who dodged it, and then landed a terrific blow on his opponent, knocking him several feet, at full length on the floor. Muscle mildly said "enough," got up and very easily returned to business without further comment.

Yesterday J F Taylor and Clyde Hill rode Columbia safes from Albany to So-daville, over miscellaneous roads, in 2 hours and ten minutes, the quickest the trip has ever been made by bicycle, and probably by team.

County school superintendent Russell and Mr Smith his uncle, returned Saturday from Fish and Clear lakes where they have been fishing and otherwise enjoying themselves. They caught an abundance of salmon trout, a sample of which they left at this office. They brought home about fifty pounds.

The Pacific Rural Press, published at Portland, gives Hon. R. A. Irvine, of this city, a complimentary notice of considerable length, and of a deserved nature, which as one of the most prominent farmers of the state he is entitled to. Mr Irvine who has done so much to build up the grange in Linn county, is now also working energetically for the farmers alliance.

Mr Henry Perkins, an old miner, who has done this entire coast from Idaho to Arizona, arrived in Albany this morning from the latter territory. Mr Perkins left Albany just twenty-five years ago yesterday, after a residence here of two or three years. He was pleased to learn that his old friend Martin Payne, Nimrod Price, C P Burkhardt and others were still among the living. After examining some ore from the Sanilam mines he pronounced it good, and proposes to go to the mines himself and see the prospects. In Arizona the big fish are freezing the little ones out, so that a common miner doesn't stand much chance.

HON. JEFF. MYERS returned yesterday from an extended trip through the east and this morning the Oregonian gives a column and a half interview with him. He was in Chicago, New York, Washington, the New England and southern states, in fact, everywhere. Among other things he said: "While traveling through the middle and eastern states I took pains to ascertain the condition of the farming classes, and I was surprised to learn of the hard times they all complain of. In talking with some of the farmers I learned that there is a general desire to get out west, and especially into the Willamette valley. All are suffering from taxes, droughts, floods or other disturbances, and they would willingly give up half their possessions to get out to Oregon. I tell you, Oregonians don't know how well off they are. The Willamette valley is not half advertised or understood, and if the present dull times continue in the east, there is no telling how many eastern farmers will seek homes here during the next few years." Mr Myers was at the Ohio democratic convention. He thinks the contest between Campbell and McKinley will be close. In presidential matters he looks for Pattison to be heard from on the democratic ticket, and looks to Harrison being nominated by the republicans. "Although I had an enjoyable time visiting cities that I had never seen before, the pleasure one experiences in crossing the Oregon line returning home is beyond my power to express. There is no place like Oregon after all, and an Oregonian never feels happy unless he has his feet on Oregon soil. All want to know about Oregon."

NEVER INITIATED.—The Oregonian editor is very bright, and can see a point as quickly as an Englishman. The Scio Press stated that the chain gang (meaning of course the Odd Fellows, often called the three linkers or chain gang) assisted a resident there, and though there are no convicts nearer than Salem, the Oregonian gets off the following (probably written by a new editor who thinks Scio holds the state penitentiary): "Scio has found a way of using prisoners that cannot be objected to on the grounds of 'convicts versus free labor.' Jasper Crabtree, a respectable farmer living near Scio, was taken sick recently, and was unable to attend to his duties about the farm. His neighbors secured the services of the chain gang, and going to his hay field, shocked up about thirty-five acres of hay for him. Thus two good deeds were performed. The prisoners were made to work and a neighbor in distress served."

At the time of his death six other members of the family were ill with fever, and owing to his illness his hay crop had not been harvested. Brother Odd Fellows attended to the latter and relatives and neighbors to the former. Mr Crabtree, a pioneer resident of the county, was a man highly respected by all, and leaves many to mourn his death.

Mr. Crabtree was born in November, 1844, about four miles south of The Dalles, while his parents were on their way to Linn county, hence was a native Oregonian.
