A LONG TIME BETWEEN DRINKS.

Every man in the United States is supposed to know what the "governor of North Carolina" said to the governor of South Carolina, but possibly some do not know when and under what circumstances the famous remark was made, says the New York Sun.

Nearly a century ago a man prominent in political affairs in North Carolina moved across the border and settled in South Carolina. He had been there only a short time when he committed some small crime or misdemeanor, for which he was indicted. To escape arrest he returned to his old home in North Carolina. In due course of time the governor of South Carolina issued his requisition on the governor of North Carolina for the fugitive criminal.

The fugitive had rich and influential friends in his native state, and they interceded with the governor until he refused to grant the requisition. A long official correspondence followed. Prominent men in South Carolina told the governor that he had not been treated with proper official courtesy by the governor of North Carolina.

The result was that the South Carolina governor, accompanied by a large party of friends and advisers, journeyed by stage to Raleigh, the capital of North Carolina, for a conference with the governor about the matter of giving up the criminal.

The governor of North Carolina, with a large party of distinguished friends, met the governor of South Carolina several miles from town and escorted them to the governor's mansion with all the ceremony due such distinguished visitors.

Before the object of the visit was stated the entire party sat down to an elaborate dinner. After dinner, wine was served, and after wine came brandy—the apple-jack for which the old north state is famous.

After many rounds of drinks the decanters and glasses were removed, and the governor of South Carolina stated the object of his visit. He demanded the surrender of the fugitive criminal. The governor of North Carolina refused. Then followed a long and heated discussion, in which the attorney-generals of the two states took an active part.

Finally the governor of South Carolina grew angry, and rising to his feet, he said: "Sir, you have refused my just demand and offended the dignity of my office and my state. Unless you at once surrender the fugitive I will return to my capital, call out the militia of the state, and returning with my army I will take the fugitive by force of arms. Governor, what do you say?"

All eyes were turned on the governor of North Carolina, and his answer was awaited with breathless interest. The governor rose slowly to his feet and beckoned to a servant who stood some distance away. His beckoning was firm and dignified as became his position. He was slow about answering, and again the governor of South Carolina demanded, "What do you say?"

"I say, governor, that it's a long time between drinks."

The reply restored good humor. Decanters and glasses were brought out again, and, while the visitors remained, if any one attempted to refer to the diplomatic object of the visit he was cut short by the remark that it was "a long time between drinks."

When the visiting governor was ready to return home he was escorted to the state line by the governor of North Carolina, and they parted the best of friends. The fugitive was never surrendered.

LITTLE TELL-TALES.

Daily little tell-tales concerning the deceptions practiced by protection propagandists are coming to the surface. The following dispatch from Buffalo, New York, is one among the many:

The American Glucose company, which has factories here and in other cities, and agencies in the most prominent cities, has announced a general reduction of 10 per cent. in wages.

A general reduction of ten per cent. in wages. This means that the laborer who has heretofore received \$2 per day will henceforth receive \$1.80 per day. Let us see. Did not our republican friends, led by the great McKinley, say something about increasing the tariff in order that our labor people might have good wages? Indeed, they did. McKinley stood up in his place in congress and asserted in the most positive way that labor people were to have better wages under his new law than they had formerly been receiving. For this purpose he increased the duty on glucose from 20 to 29 per cent. This is followed by a reduction in the wages of 10 per cent. This makes the downfall of protectionism.

Mrs Fremont and her daughter are now in possession of the house that was presented to them by a committee of Los Angeles ladies. It is a pretty and comfortable cottage of the suburban style of architecture, and cost, with the lot on which it stands, \$5,000. There is still a small encumbrance of about \$700 on the property.

Though not famed for any particular displays of statesmanship Mr Wheeler, the republican nominee for governor of Iowa, is noted for his studs—both diamond and Percheron. The latter is said to be worth \$500 and the former \$5,000.

A statement prepared at the treasury department shows that the receipts from customs at the port of New York for the seven months of the present calendar year have fallen off, as compared with the corresponding months of the calendar year 1890, of \$22,444,378. The receipts for July, 1891, were \$11,353,160, while for July, 1890, they were \$17,173,016, showing a falling off of nearly \$6,000,000. It is estimated that two-thirds of the custom duties paid in the United States are collected at the port of New York. Other ports show as great a decrease as New York. If the same decrease continues during the year, receipts from customs at New York will show a falling off of \$36,000,000 and from all parts of the United States of about \$48,000,000 as compared with 1890.

Quay and Dudley have resigned from the national republican committee and Erhardt as collector of customs at New York. Now if Noble and Raunt should follow suit, what a striking block-of-five we would have.
