TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

A Priest in Trouble.

SONOMISH, Wash, Aug 6.—A crowd of about sixty men went to the residence of Father Guay last night, took him from the house, administered a liberal coat of tar and feathers, and gave him twenty-four hours to leave town. The party consisted of many prominent citizens, both Protestants and Catholics. Guay's crimes have thoroughly demoralized the town, and the feeling against him was so strong that with difficulty the crowd was prevented from lynching him. He evidently had been expecting a visit from hostile quarters, as it is said his body was thoroughly greased, which in a measure foiled the good effect of his decorations. When the party arrived the priest ran out of the back door, but was captured. Acing a very large, powerful man he made a desperate fight, but was quickly overpowered, stripped and thoroughly coated. His howling could be heard for five blocks, but a friendly pocket handkerchief stopped it. This morning he expressed an intention of staying in town, but a message from the bishop ordered him to leave immediately, which he did tonight, taking the train to Seattle.

A R. R. Accident.

SYRACUSE, N. Y. Aug 6.—The St. Louis express on the West Shore road met with a terrible accident three miles west of Port Byron, this morning. The train was running at a high rate of speed and at that point ran into a freight train. The wreck was an awful one, and up to 9:30 o'clock the deaths numbered eleven; two died later in the day. Those who were killed outright and those who died from their injuries were all Italians, except one, the fireman of the passenger train. Eleven more Italians are badly hurt, and four will probably die. Twelve cars of the freight train were wrecked and piled upon the track, completely blocking the tracks.

Death of a Race Horse.

SARATOGA, N. Y. Aug 6.—Proctor Knott, the well known race horse, died in his stall at Horse Haven. His name and fame are known to turfmen all over the country, for while his form during the past two years has not been the highest, as a 2-year-old, he won laurels enough to place him among the most famous race horses of the country. He captured both the junior champion and Futurity in the latter defeating Salvo after a great finish. He cost his owner \$25 as a yearling and won for him more than \$100,000 in the three seasons that he raced.

A Doctor Fined.

SPOKANE, Aug 6.—In the case of the state against Dr. G. W. Carey, for practicing medicine without a license, which was tried yesterday in Judge Camp's court, the jury this morning at 10 o'clock returned a verdict of guilty, after having been out since 4:30 yesterday afternoon. Judge Curry sentenced Carey to pay a fine of \$50 and the costs of the prosecution. An appeal was immediately taken to the supreme court, and the appeal bond was fixed at \$100. Dr. Carey gave the bonds.

An Earthquake again Visits Charleston.

COLUMBIA, S. C. Aug 6.—From conductors of incoming trains, it is learned that a decided earthquake shock was felt at Charleston, about midnight last night. No damage was done, but the shock was of such force as to rattle windows. The local newspapers in Charleston make no mention of it, and newspaper earthquake news, it is said, for fear of injuring the commercial interests of the city.

Grand Commander Palmer.

DETROIT, Aug 6.—Immediately after the meeting of the Grand Army encampment this morning the election of commander-in-chief was declared the first business. There were four candidates: John Palmer, of New York; A. G. Weissert, of Milwaukee; W. P. Sinedberg, of California; and S. H. Hurst, of Ohio. John Palmer was elected on the second ballot amid great enthusiasm.
