

AN ALLIANCE MAN TALKS.

The Kansas Farmer, United States Senator Peffer's paper, is publishing the opinion of Kansas alliance men on the subject of the sub-treasury scheme. That there is much division of sentiment among alliance people on this subject can not be doubted. C W Shum, alliance candidate for governor last fall, President McGrath and W A Harris one of the leading candidates for senator last fall have all come out against the scheme. Mr Harris gives his views as follows: "After a most brilliant victory was nearly won, by some strange means an additional claim, feature, or demand was added to the broad principles of true and just government under which we had fought, and the so-called sub-treasury scheme was brought forth—a scheme in its essential features modeled after all the most vicious and corrupt practices which we had condemned; a scheme patterned after the illegitimate loaning of money by the government to the national banks and to railroads and the warehousing and storing of goods for importers and distillers; a scheme to tax the many for the benefit of the few, and of even the most doubtful benefit to those few. It would be confirmed in its operation to the wealthier localities and would benefit the few who were located within a few miles of the point of location, utterly ignoring the laboring man, the mechanic, the tradesman, and in fact every class of men save those who raise grain for sale.

Some men have gone so far as to assert that loyalty to this monstrosity is a test of true alliance faith, when in fact, it gives the lie to every principle of pure, just government of, by, and for the whole people, which we asserted as our motive, and proclaimed through the St Louis platform. Today the good men, the honest men, the intelligent men all over the country are pausing and asking themselves:

"Are these only a new swarm of hungry and selfish self-seekers? Is this the way the new party of patriots proposes to use its power? If so, wherein are they different from the old crowd? What has become of the high-sounding motto, Equal rights to all and special privileges to none? Is it only sound and fury, signifying nothing, and a pretext to get and then abuse the power of the people?"

Such are the reflections that are heard and felt everywhere and that are causing a rapid revival of the spirits of the two old parties, which are gleefully congratulating themselves and preparing vigorously to take advantage of this grave mistake. Special privileges we deny to others. Let us not disgrace ourselves before all mankind by hastening to claim them for ourselves. Rather let us show that we can be trusted with power, that we can use it fairly for all, and that the welfare of the whole people is what we seek.

The farmer and laboring-man need and ask only a free market and fair trade for the product of their hands and brains, a fair and equitable division of the rewards of labor and capital, and an honest and just utilization of the country. They ask no more; they should be content with nothing less. On the St. Louis platform every patriotic American can and will stand and fight. The sub-treasury scheme will be a fatal net, binding their arms and laying them prostrate at the feet of the sword-man.

Mills of Texas made a two-hour speech to ten thousand people at Iowa City, Iowa, last Thursday. He met with a magnificent reception, being met by farmers who came thirty miles to hear him. The associated press told us nothing about it. The followers of protection were torn from their very moorings and set adrift. Many of them will land safely in the democratic harbor this fall.

And now comes Conger of Ohio, member of the national republican committee, who says he has consulted Blaine about his candidacy for the presidency, telling him of the steadfast devotion of those who have been his friends for years and they want him to be a candidate again, and that Blaine was very much affected by this expression of renewed devotion, and winds up by saying that Blaine will accept the nomination again.

John H Mitchell has been invited to take part in the Ohio campaign in behalf of McKinley. The republicans of Ohio are making the effort of their lives to win the victory. With 25,000 majority to start with they ought to have a large majority easily.
