LAST POPULAR EXCURSION.—The announcement of the last cheap excursion of this season to Newport has caused a rush for tickets, and no doubt the largest crowd of the year will leave tomorrow morning for the seaside. The management has been able, through the kindness of the O P R Co's officials, to allow all who wish the privilege of remaining over until either Monday or Tuesday, which will be highly appreciated by many who otherwise would be unable to participate in the varied pleasures afforded by a brief visit to the ocean beach. The salmon fishing season is now at its height and many fine Chinooks are daily captured in Yaquina bay. The surf is warm and pleasant, and as the undertow so common at the other ocean resorts has never been felt at Newport, the bathers may enjoy a dip in the waves without danger. Train will leave Albany at 7 a m, arriving at Newport at 11 a m, returning, leave Newport at 5:30 and arriving at Albany at 9:30 p m. Fare for round trip, \$2.50, including boat fares. Tickets on sale at Wells, Fargo & Co's office and at the train on its departure.

THE CORRECT FIGURES.—Recently we published the rates on the Southern Pacific from Albany to Portland as shown by the schedule gotten out by the R R Commission. Mr Jester, local agent here gives us the correct figures: Green fruit, present rate, 15 cts; car load lots, 18 cts; as revised by R R Com., same; vegetables, 15 cts, as revised 13 cts; grain 13 cts, as revised, 9 cts; lumber, 10 cts, as revised, 7 1/2 cts; horses, etc., \$30; as revised, \$36; sheep, \$26, as revised \$28. The average cut at Salem, Albany, Eugene, Roseburg and Ashland is 7 per cent on green fruit, 19 per cent on vegetables, 30 per cent on grain; 14 per cent on lumber, 14 per cent on horses, etc., 4 1/2 per cent on sheep. On the west side the cut is 34 per cent on grain, 11 per cent on lumber, 7 per cent on horses, etc., 3 per cent on sheep, etc.

Dan Large has received the contract for furnishing the piles for the Albany bridge. The contract has not been let for the lumber yet.
