A Game of Base Ball.—A game of base ball was played yesterday afternoon at Newport between a picked nine from Albany and the Newport club, which was the most attractive feature of the season. The Newport boys were in bathing suits, etcetera. At the end of two innings the score was 2 to 0 in favor of Newport. At the end of the third inning the score was 7 to 5 in favor of Albany. A pretty game. In the fourth inning Albany rattled the ball, and the Newporters made several runs. The score was 10 to 5 in favor of Albany. Albany having the last out, did not go to the bat. The Albany nine consisted of Smiley, C. Larimer, J. Blodgett, H. Brewer, of Salem, J. Will Campbell, 3b; C. H. Mueller, cf; J. D. Morris, lf; Allen Chamberlain, c; and a stranger, R. A. San Franciscoan. We get the above particulars from Mr. Geo. C. Stannard, who saw the game and returned this noon.
Not Well Taken.—The Oregon Pacific light draft steamer, Three Sisters, failed to arrive last night, and the reason for not being here she stuck on the bar at Lincoln. And during all this time, while the Oregon Pacific is endeavoring to keep its boats running during the whole season between Salem and Portland, the government tugboat is laboring between Albany and Corvallis, where it is not so noticeable to carry on navigation during the summer months. It seems the Corvallis should be working now between Salem and Oregon City, where the Corvallis only takes out passengers and mail. It has already taken out the sugar below Salem. All this is for the fall and winter. We need a bar boat, that's the rub.
A Runaway Accident.—Last evening Mr. Frank E. Anson and Mr. Robt. H. H. were out riding a trade of horses at the City stables. They had tied Mr. E. Anson's horse in front of a dog cart, and then hitched Mr. H. H.'s horse up and started off, but the dog cart was not properly fastened and the cart and horses became in contact causing the animal to rear at a rather vicious rate, going up against the corner at the Evangelical church, tipping over the cart and dumping the men out. Mr. H. H. was unhurt; but Mr. Anson had his face badly bruised, necessitating the attention of a surgeon. Dr. J. L. Hill being called. The trade was not made. On getting up Mr. Anson remarked that he wouldn't have the horse at any price.
NOT BY ANY MEANS.—The people of this county have abandoned all hope of living long enough to witness the completion of the Oregon Pacific railroad. Even the Albany newspapers have ceased their work of construction on this hopelessly defective line, and that of itself is sufficient evidence that the thing is dead enough for interment. We must now look to another source for a railroad, or the hope of one, and we know of but one direction in which to look, viz., The Dalles.—Prineville News. The Albany papers have not ceased their work of construction. Notwithstanding the present unpleasantness, the road will go ahead to Boise City. Of course we cannot name the date; but there is little doubt that it will be built, and in no immense number of years. Such a road is not going to stop in the middle of a range of mountains.
