LOCAL RECORD.

CIRCUS.—Good sized audiences, considering the fact that it is the middle of the harvest season, attended Sells Bros. yesterday. As a rule no two people go on a circus performance, and those who pay a dollar are very particular. The manager is a good one, particularly those who have not seen it once, and performance, the writer considers, a very entertaining one. Some of the features are peculiarly daring ones. The Japs are immense and the Arabs, though not an expert, yet form a very interesting feature. Nothing better done than the Greek statuaries. The contortionists are the best ever here. The tumbling, high and on the ground, was good, the dogs, bicyclists, etc., were by all means worth witnessing. The clowns have deteriorated and now they simply slap each other, a senseless and uninteresting chestnut.

A BIG UNIVERSITY.—Oregon is on the eve of having a great university, equal to the best eastern college, as well as to the Leland Stanford, Jr. university of Calif. It is reported that W S Ladd and H W Corbett each offers to give \$1,000,000 towards a college, to be under the auspices of the Presbyterian church, and to be located in Portland, an additional \$1,000,000 to be raised in the church, making \$3,000,000 as a starter. This would be a great thing for the N W and it is to be hoped such a college will be founded, one that will rank in standing with Harvard, Yale or Princeton.

LOTS OF LOGS.—Last Saturday a party of loggers completed a drive of two million feet of logs to the Harrisburg saw mill from up the McKenzie. They took six million feet as far as Coburg and left four million feet there for Goodale's mill. Yesterday they were in this city packing up to go to the Middle Fork after a drive of 1,400,000 feet for the mill in this city. They will then take another drive down the McKenzie. The rivers are a little low now for driving logs and they go only about a mile a day.—Register.

MINING OPERATIONS.—The mill recently taken to the Poorman mine in the Blue river district is now in running order, and commenced operations last Wednesday. It is not in first class running order but is doing very well. The flume is not steep enough and clogs. They have 500 tons of ore on the dump ready for the mill. The Blue river mining company have a small force at work and have tunneled into the hill about sixty feet. A large mill is needed to assist in developing the mines.—Register. They will learn there, as in the Santian district, that cheap mills are of no use except for prospecting.

WHEAT.—Wheat has dropped as suddenly as it arose, says the Pendleton E O. Saturday 80 cents in the sack was paid for several lots. Tuesday the price was seven or eight points lower. Quite a number of farmers unloaded, however, when the market reached the top notch. In Albany the price is 80½ cents. Whether to keep it or sell is a very serious question for the farmer to decide. Reports today show a rising tendency.

A TRAMP RUN OVER.—From Dr H A Davis, of Harrisburg, the particulars are learned of a railroad accident at that city last evening. The freight train was late arriving there about 8 o'clock. After it left the remains of a man, evidently a tramp, were found on the track, with indications that he had fallen from a break beam on the freight train. He was badly mutilated, and nothing was found on him to identify him.

A MINISTER INJURED.—Wednesday forenoon of this week while assisting in clearing ground for the new Methodist church at Glensda, Rev Thompson met with an accident which will cripple him for life. He was hard at work felling a tree and had just struck the last blow with his ax, and as the tree began to fall he stepped back to keep from being struck by it, but unfortunately and inadvertently in the direction of where Mr Henry Nelson was also felling a tree, and directly in the path of Mr Nelson's ax, which was being brought down with tremendous force. The blade of the ax struck Mr Thompson about eight inches from the point of the left shoulder, cutting a deep gash in the flesh about six inches in length and severing the point of the radius—elbow joint—of the left forearm. The ax was a very sharp one and had it struck his arm it would doubtless have buried itself in his side. The gentleman was at once taken to Mr Brown's residence in Florence. Dr Cloyd was called and the wound was dressed. The severing of the bone will necessarily stiffen the arm.—West.
