At The Dalles there were fourteen applicants for teachers' certificates at the recent public examination, and seven passed. There were one first-grade, four second grades and two third-grades.

Farmers are scratching their heads over the wheat question. The result is the sale of some wheat every day. Many will keep for the traditional dollar, which it is at least to be hoped they secure.

According to the Coos Bay Sun the big fat pen blik in Albany recently has been doing that country: Marshfield is full of blooming suckers, a new opportunity having conclusively proven it. A big belled blik did them up Saturday night in great shape, in a "dead sure winning game." Putting \$250 in envelopes—bright crisp greenbacks—was too much for our sportive lads, and the alternate blank that the manipulator claimed to put in had no terrors for him. Neither did he seem to know or care how often the big box was replenished with blank envelopes. On this particular occasion this philanthropic sucker of fools' put \$300 into 232 envelopes and sold them out at \$1 each, giving with each a box of pens. When they came to count noses by far the largest half of our boys were losers and some are wondering yet "how it could be."

WEATHER REPORT.

OREGON WEATHER BUREAU. CENTRAL OFFICE, PORTLAND, OREGON. CROP-WEATHER BULLETIN No. 24, FOR THE WEEK ENDING SATURDAY, AUG. 22, 1891.

In western Oregon rain fell on the night of the 17th and on the 18th throughout this section, in amount from .10 to .20 of an inch, except in Josephine and Jackson counties where only a few drops fell. The temperature was below the average in forepart of the week, but rose rapidly towards the close until today when it was from 90 to 100 degrees, except along the coast.

The rain did no damage to the grain, but delayed harvesting and threshing for one day. There was some slight benefit in the rain to corn and vegetables. Winter wheat is all cut and most of it threshed; spring grain is being cut. Some smut exists in Douglas and Jackson counties. Grain is yielding better than was expected in every county; 56 bushels per acre from a 16 acre field is reported from Yamhill county; in Polk county the wheat generally averaged over 30 bushels per acre; most counties have an average yield of from 25 to 35 bushels per acre. The woolly aphid is doing damage to orchards in Yamhill county. The onion crop was injured by lice in Washington county, but as the acreage was increased the total crop will be above the average. Hop growers expect now to gather a very fair average crop. In Douglas, Jackson and Curry counties the first crop of figs are over and the second crop is now setting. The early peaches are about over and the second crop will be ripe next week; several carloads a day are being shipped from Jackson county. Josephine county is shipping 3 carloads a day of watermelons. Fruit drying is in progress.

In eastern Oregon no damage was done by the rain, though harvesting operations were delayed for about half a day in various localities. Winter wheat is generally all threshed and considerable of the spring sown grain has also been threshed, except east and south of the Blue mountains. All the reports indicate the yield to be above the expectations of the farmers, except in parts of Wasco county.
