FATAL RUNAWAY ACCIDENT.

Chas. A. Rinehart Instantly Killed While Hauling Wheat.

A few moments after 11 o'clock this forenoon Mr. Chas. A. Rinehart was driving a four horse team, with two wagons of wheat, along First Street, and was just east of the Russ House, when he whipped up the leaders with a strong stroke of his long whip. The horses resented it and leaped forward, and immediately the whole four horses were rearing and plunging forward. The hind wagon dropped loose at once. Opposite the Albany Iron Works one of the hind horses stopped and fell. Mr Rinehart was jerked violently from the wagon to the ground, striking heavily on his forehead and falling over under the rapidly approaching wheels, which passed over his body at his breast. The team went nearly a block further, dragging the fallen horse, when the wagon passed over it and the whole outfit was stopped. Mr Rinehart was picked up dead. Drs Wallace and Whitney were called and stated that death was caused instantly by the blow on the head, concussion of the brain resulting. One of the jaw bones was broken and two ribs.

Coroner Frank Farrell called a jury consisting of W. E. McPherson, D. T. Wyman, Thos. Froman, J. H. Townsend, John Schmeer and Wm. Peterson, who found substantially according to the facts above, that death resulted accidentally. Dr Davis examined the body before the jury giving substantially the same opinion as that by the other surgeons.

Mr Rinehart had worked on the farm of Mr J. B. McFarland, near Tangent, for sometime, last winter renting part of the farm and since then was running it on his own account. He was a young man of splendid habits, steady and industrious, about twenty-five years of age, and was well liked by all who knew him. His parents reside at Sweet Home and he has a brother at Brownsville. The accident caused considerable excitement.

MISFITS.

WHEAT, 85 CENTS.

No. 1 of Vol. 1 of the North Yamhill Leader has been received. It is published by Mr Ira Phelps, recently of the Halsey News, and is well gotten up.

There are now one hundred twenty-nine newspapers in Oregon. One over an average of four to each county in the state. This was the last report. How many have been started and suspended in the last day or two is not known.

Brunk Bros., of Eola, claim to have got 37½ bushels per acre from 225 acres of wheat this year, 45 acres averaging 45½ bushels.—Journal. A small can of wheat which has been in the DEMOCRAT office seven or eight years was from the same farm, and was from a field the average yield of which it was claimed was seventy bushels per acre.

The Plai dealer twists an item from the DEMOCRAT into the following frightful shape, particularly the last paragraph: A few days ago while three Albany nimrods were out hunting one of them shot a deer and crippled it. The animal disappeared in the bushes but was soon heard to make a peculiar noise. E W Hammond, the Winer, Jackson county, botanist, went over to Slisson Sunday to make an inspection of a certain tree with a great long Latin name and pedigree. Trees and shrubs are a very interesting subject to Mr H., though the average man would consider it exceedingly dull. Mr Hammond estimates that there are 100,000,000,000 feet of lumber in the trees of Oregon, the transportation of which would require 200 carloads per day for each working day in the year for a thousand years.
