THEY ARE IN IT TOO.

The Salem Journal publishes extracts from a letter from A. F. Hofer Sr., a relation of the editor of that paper, for the purpose of comparing conditions in Germany with those in the United States in order that conclusions may be drawn favorable to high protectionism. A. F. Hofer after being away from Germany forty-two years is now back there on a visit. He says:

We cannot but see a great difference between the old world and the new, and I am glad to state that the difference is all in favor of the latter. The people here are poor, suppressed by heavy taxes, and consequently dissatisfied and prepared to expect anything.

And who are the German people? They are those, who, like many in the United States, have become blindly infatuated with the promised beauties of so called "protection," which evidently operates there as it does here—makes the rich richer and the poor poorer, and causes the cry to go up all over the German empire that the poor laboring masses are "suppressed" by heavy taxes. So idolatrous did the German people become in times past with reference to the benefits of so called "protection" that they even prohibited entirely the importation of American pork into that country. But thanks to the shades of Cobden and British gold they have been induced to remove the prohibition and Germany has the blessings of free trade in pork.

"The laboring classes are hard worked, with poor and scanty food."

And this, too, where the system of high tariff has long prevailed. Indeed, the wages paid to these poor people are hardly half as high as those paid to similar laborers in free trade England. We thank the Journal for this emphatic lesson. Hear Mr. Hofer again.

"We seldom see a peasant woman without some kind of a burden on her back, and often so heavy that a pack mule would easily sweat under it. A wheelbarrow or some other vehicle is an almost perpetual attachment to a farmer's wife or grown daughter, while the milk cows are worked hard in the harness from morning until night. The observations I make are most painful to me."

What a picture whose every outline is the ultimate result of high tariff. Germany is a model protection country.

THE OUTLOOK.

Congressman Bynum, of Indiana, who is with the crowd of democratic celebrities who are now on a visit to this coast was interviewed at St. Paul Tuesday on the political outlook. He said:

"Both sides are pretending to have confidence in the success of their candidate, but as a matter of fact, neither side is very confident. Either party may win by a great majority, or the election may be very close. I believe that Governor Campbell is stronger now than when he was nominated. If Ohio goes democratic the republicans may as well throw up all hope for 1892. I regard Campbell as a presidential possibility if he is elected. Whether Cleveland will be the democratic nominee for president or not depends on how New York goes. If the New York delegation is for Cleveland, then he will be nominated. If they are against him, he probably will not."

"I do not regard Blaine as a presidential possibility, not to say probability. I do not compare his chances of election with those of Cleveland or any other democrat, because he will not be the nominee. His health will not permit of his being a candidate. I am not speaking from a partisan standpoint at all in saying this."

"Indiana is democratic. We know this. We have the most perfect organization of any place in the country. I am a free silver man and was one of the 'three' that introduced and advocated the measure in the Forty-ninth congress. I think a measure providing for the free coinage of our own silver only will be eventually carried through."

"Governor Black declined to discuss silver or tariff as he is president of the association of democratic clubs, but said Pennsylvania will go to the democrats this year on account of the Philadelphia trouble. 'I tell you we think a good deal of Governor up our way,' said he in speaking of presidential candidates. 'I do not regard Blaine a candidate.'"

Senator Faulkner, in speaking of his state, said West Virginia could safely be classed as democratic by 3000 to 5000 majority. On account of the Philadelphia scandal he thought the republicans had practically given up Pennsylvania to the democrats.
